

AIMEE HEARING POSTPONED DAY

New Evidence Against Mrs. McPherson to Be Offered Tomorrow

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 6 (AP).—The Times says two startling revelations in the Aimee Semple McPherson case have been brought to light. The first is the discovery of a penciled draft of the famous "Miss X" affidavit by Mrs. Lorrain Wiseman-Sellaff, confessed perpetrator of the Carmel hoax, declared by the district attorney's office to be in the evangelist's handwriting. The second is the disclosure of an attempt on behalf of Mrs. McPherson to regain possession of clothing worn by the evangelist when she reappeared at Douglas, Ariz., and now entered as state's evidence in the pastor's trial on conspiracy charges.

The penciled notes were taken from Mrs. Sellaff's safety deposit box following her confession that she had been employed to produce false witnesses to substantiate the evangelist's kidnapping story. According to a statement to the district attorney's office by Mrs. Sellaff, the notes were dictated by Mrs. Kennedy, the pastor's mother, and written by Mrs. McPherson while the two women were in close conference with Mrs. Sellaff in Mrs. McPherson's bedroom adjoining Anglos Temple. From this draft Mrs. Sellaff later prepared her affidavit, made at Salinas, in which she swore that she was the companion of Kenneth G. Ormiston, missing radio man, during a 19-day stay at Carmel-by-the-sea, she has admitted to district attorneys investigating.

The newly found evidence is expected to be offered when the prosecution resumes presentation of its case tomorrow at the preliminary hearing for Mrs. McPherson and her mother. The evidence is expected to lay the foundation for the testimony of Mrs. Sellaff, who will be called as the state's star witness and the evangelist's accuser.

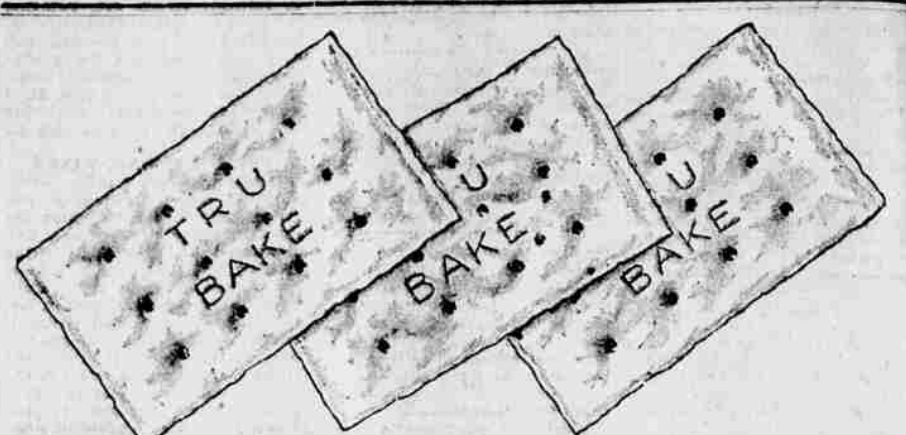

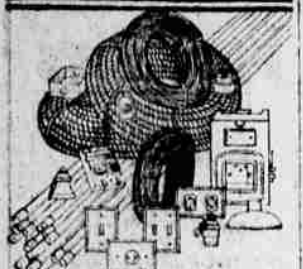
