## Astoria Rejects All Bids on Bonds

ASTORIA, Ore., Oct. 7.—All bids for the \$1,400,000 issue of re-estimated improvement bonds of the city were rejected at a meeting of the council upon the recommendation of City Manager Kraatz and Chairman Seeborg of the finance committee.

It was the expressed belief of these officials that better bids can be had for the issue when the bond market settles, reports having it that the Florida disaster has somewhat disturbed the eastern market for municipal bonds. The city manager also pointed out that only one of the bids strictly complied with the terms of the call by quoting a figure on the whole amount. Since this bid would not result in any great saving to the city, it was decided to advertise for new bids at a later day.

The city does not have to sell the bonds and will only do so when it is to its financial advantage to do so.

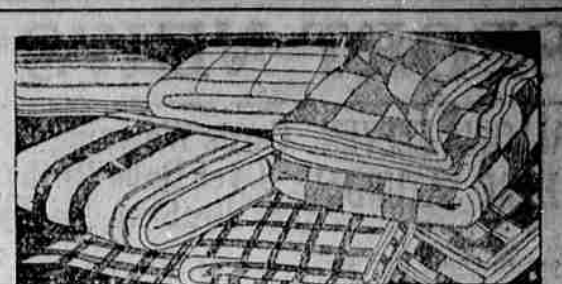
