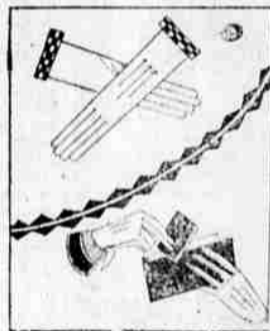

University Team, Crippled, Departs for Portland to Play Huskies

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 8 (AP)—On the eve of the game with the University of Washington in Portland, which takes place in Portland tomorrow, gloom has settled over the camp of the University of Oregon. Last Saturday's nothing to nothing to with Little Pacific university started the shadows of doubt, and announcement of three injured men of the first string made sadness a settled fact. Hansen, a star on last year's freshman squad at end, and holder of the end berth on the varsity this season, will be unable to play because of a back. He has been working out despite his handicap, but an infection from one of the beds of his arm is giving him more trouble than was anticipated. Lynn Jones star fullback, is bothered with an injured knee, and Ira Woodie, quarterback, is held up by an injured shoulder.

The starting lineup has not been announced by Captain John J. McEwen, coach. He said that he would not be sure of his starting combination until just before the game.

Portland Daily Tonight

WASHINGTON'S LINEUP

SEATTLE, Oct. 8 (AP)—Coach Enoch W. Bagshaw before leaving here today for Portland with his University of Washington football team, indicated that the following would be the line up against the University of Oregon in the first conference game of the season tomorrow.

Tom Douglas and Leroy Schulz, ends; Herman Erik and Pat Wilson, tackles; Bob Shaw and Eugene Cook, guards; Romeo Lawson, center; Captain George Guttersen, quarter; Bill Charlston, fullback; Louis Torseau and Harold Patton halfbacks. All are left-handed. From it are missing two regulars—Douglas Bonamy, center, and Jim Galling end. They are listed among the reserves as are Mike Hanley, Earl Pape, Curt Spilliers, Les Lew, Elmer Halita, Ken Olson, John Stombough, Johnny Depest, Sam Russo, and Walter Smith.

In the opinion of experts who have daily watched the purple torseaux in action, the starters constitute a real threat against the lemon and yellow eleven. But, it is pointed out, should Guttersen or Torseau be forced out of the game, high calibre substitutes for them will be looking. Guttersen is slated to start the kicking, with Torseau due to take over the duties as soon as he does. Torseau is called upon as the center of Washington offense. Bagshaw expects that he will make the most yardage and do the heavy work in the passing attack.

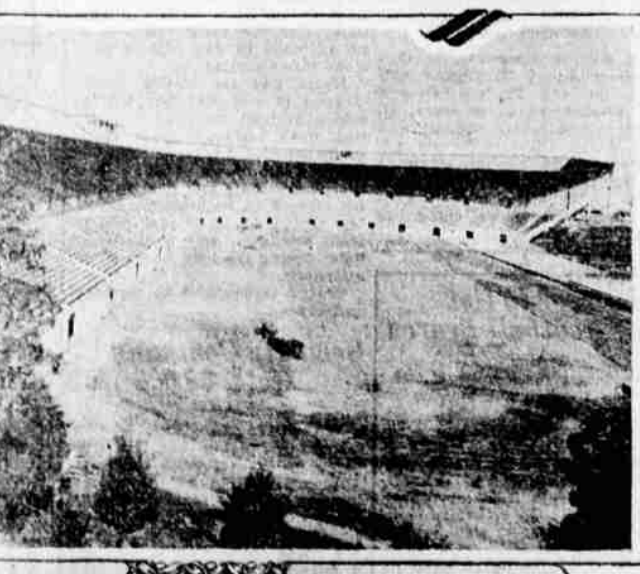

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Oct. 7. (Special)—One of the most up-to-date stadiums on the Pacific coast will be dedicated Saturday, Oct. 9, when football eleven from the University of Oregon and University of Washington take the field of the new Multnomah Civic stadium at 500 boxes are shattered.
