Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast — Orange juice, cereal, thin cream, creamed eggs on toast, crisp whole wheat toast, fresh peach butter, milk, coffee.

Luncheon — Corn and tomatoes on toast, bread rolls, apple sauce, ginger bread, milk, tea.

Dinner — Pork tenderloin, scalloped potatoes, buttered spinach, cabbage and celery salad, health bread, chilled watermelon, milk, coffee.

ORDER the tenderloin "Frenched." This means that the strip of loin is cut in lengths of 2 1/2 or 3 inches. Each piece is placed on end and flattened with one blow of the broad side of a meat cleaver. Cook the meat thoroughly, allowing about 45 minutes.

Corn and Tomatoes on Toast. Six ears of sweet corn, 1 small onion, 2 sweet green peppers, 3 large tomatoes, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon sugar, salt and pepper, triangles of toast.

Score corn through the center of each row of kernels. Cut off tops and scrape out milk and heart. Peel and mince onion. Scald peppers and rub off thin coating. Remove seeds and white pith and mince flesh. Scald tomatoes and slip off skins. Chop. Melt butter in a deep frying pan. Add vegetables and cook 20 minutes. Season with salt, sugar and pepper and serve on hot buttered toast.

Evening Frocks Varied This Fall

Evening frocks are so varied this autumn that it is difficult to classify them. The main distinction made by Bond Street is one of silhouette. There is the frock that hangs straight, except when the wearer moves, and there is the definite picture gown. The straight frocks are often draped, either to one side or to the middle of the figure, the gathered folds hanging a few inches below the rest

of the hem, while the slim skirt is slashed to disclose a finely pleated underlip. These frocks are as long or as short as the wearer pleases.

BLACK HAIR VOGUE

German men prefer blacks, or at least they will during the coming social season, according to five leading Berlin tonsorial artists. They find that three-fourths of their women customers who hitherto had their hair dyed blond, now demand black.

Every disturbance of function, whether of digestive tract, urinary system, genital organs or of the glandular system should be carefully investigated in order to determine its underlying cause.

In the homely philosophy of David Harum, "treat your enemy (cancer) as he would treat you, but do it first." The means of doing this are mainly three: surgery, radium, and x-ray. There is no medicine or serum worthy of the name, not withstanding the boasts of so called "cancer-cures" which may be bought all the way from one dollar to several hundred dollars or more per bottle.

The knowledge that cancer is local in its beginning and, at such time, curable, should discourage the practice of the slightest delay in seeking the information to be obtained by the microscope and the x-ray.

Stock Shipments Are Running High

SODA SPRINGS, Pa., Oct. 8.—H. F. Pickern, local agent for the Green Sheet Line, reports that in the three-week period ended last Saturday there were shipped from Soda Springs 320 carloads of livestock, 229 of which were sheep and 79 cattle.

The sheep this year were moved almost in a body on account of the short range caused by the exceptionally dry season.

Several of the local sheepmen received the top of the market.

Mayor H. L. Finch set a record in the Chicago market, receiving for one shipment of fine lambs the sum of \$16.50 per hundred. At the Ogden Livestock show Mayor Finch sold a single ram for \$500. This eclipses his previous world record established two years ago of \$750.

The local hotels have been unable to care for the great number of sheepmen and cattlemen and buyers that have been in the city for the last few weeks.
