fugitive radio man. The new disclosures link up with evidence uncovered by the district attorney's office and outlined as follows: On May 29, 11 days after Mrs. McPherson disappeared from Ocean Park, Ormiston, accompanied by a woman, registered at a San Luis Obispo hotel as "Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gibson." Ormiston later admitted in letters to authorities that he used the name of Gibson in registering at San Luis Obispo but denied his companion was Mrs. McPherson.

On the same date Ormiston and his companion were stopped by a newspaper reporter as they motored into Santa Barbara. Ormiston gave his name as Gibson and said the woman with him was his wife.

On May 12 Ormiston appeared at San Francisco visiting his parents there. He arrived at Carmel-by-the-sea on May 14, when he deposited rent for the Boarded cottage and departed with the explanation that he would return on May 18 or 19 with his wife, whom he said was sick.

On May 19 he reappeared at Carmel with a bearded woman with whom he shared a second cottage until May 29.

University Will Celebrate Half Century of Life

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 8 (AP)—With the University of Oregon semi-centennial celebration little more than a week away, representatives from more than 155 educational institutions in the United States have accepted invitations to attend.

In addition to distinguished educators who will appear on the program of the various conferences on vital contemporary problems, more than 22 college and university presidents from all parts of the United States will be here to witness the inauguration of Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall as the fifth president of the University of Oregon.

Never officially dedicated, Deady hall, the oldest building on the campus will be the center of attention on Friday, Oct. 22, the fourth day of the celebration, when it will be formally dedicated. Two surviving members of the first class to graduate, 50 years ago, will be present. They are Judge Robert S. Bean of Portland, and Ellen Condon McCormick of Eugene.

Among the noted speakers at the semi-centennial will be Dr. Clarence Cook Little, president of the University of Michigan; Dr. Frederick L. Prerson, professor of history at the University of Wisconsin, and Dr. Joseph Schafer, superintendent of the Wisconsin Historical society, both of whom are noted historians; Dr. Frank L. McVey, president of the University of Kentucky; Dr. Arthur Crane, president of the University of Wyoming, and many other authorities in their particular fields.
