Prince Carol In Mother's Arms As Queen Leaves

PARIS, Oct. 12 (AP).—Referred to her errand son, former Crown Prince Carol, whom she embraced in ardently motherly fashion at their parting, Queen Marie of Rumania went majestically out of Paris this morning en route to America.

The queen was visibly moved when Carol finally arrived at the station a quarter of an hour before her train left for Cherbourg to connect with the Leviathan.

Mother and son went into her compartment in the Rumanian royal coach, attached to the Cherbourg boat train, and talked in private. The train was held several minutes to allow them to prolong their interview.

Carol departed as quietly as he had come, while the queen indicated from a car window an acknowledgment of the farewells from representatives of French officialdom, the United States embassy and the Rumanian colony of Paris.

Marie wore a Krummer coat of gun metal shade, fading into gray, over a simple brown tailored suit. A chic brown felt traveling hat topped her auburn head. She wore a lone white orchid over her heart. Her slippers and hose were in harmony with the rest of the costume. Despite the orders of supervising the last minute packing of the 100 pieces of luggage of the party, as well as her quite natural emotion at seeing Carol again, she looked positively radiant.

Educational Tour To Start Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12.—What is declared to be the first cooperative forest service educational tour ever to be made into Eastern Oregon will begin today, when George E. Griffith, assistant district forester in the public relations department and W. V. Fuller representing the state forester's office, will start from Portland for the Pendleton, Baker and Willowa districts. In addition to the United States and state forest services, the Oregon Forest Fire Patrol association also is sponsoring the trip.

The purpose largely is to visit small communities and better acquainted regions in an effort to explain forestry to Eastern Oregonians, Griffith said.

Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST.—Cantalope balls, cooked wheat cereal, thin cream, scrambled eggs, rice toast, marmalade, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON.—Baked meat balls, celery, praline bread, baked apple dumplings with cream, milk, tea.

DINNER.—Chili con carne, corn on the cob, tomato and cabbage salad, grape pie, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The recipe for chili con carne is given in reply to a request. This is a Mexican dish and should be quite "hot" as to seasoning. However, it's far better to sacrifice a little "color" of the dish for American personal tastes if too highly flavored dishes are not liked.

Chili powder can be used if chili peppers are not available, 3/4 to 1 tablespoon according to taste being sufficient.

Chili Con Carne
Two pounds flank steak of beef, 3 chili peppers, 1 large onion, 2 tablespoons butter or drippings, 3 tablespoons flour, Mexican beans, 2 cups hot water, 2 teaspoons salt.

Remove seeds from peppers and let stand in hot, but not boiling water until soft. Scrape pulp from the skin. Discard skin and add pulp to water. Melt butter and add meat cut in small pieces. Brown on all sides. Add onion minced and chili water. Cook until all meat is tender, adding water necessary to keep two cups over meat. Stir flour to a smooth paste with a little-cold water and add to boiling meat mixture stirring constantly. Cook five minutes and serve with beans boiled until tender separately.

Kidney beans can be substituted for the Mexican beans and 1 clove of garlic, finely minced, is often
