FOOT PRINTS OF 'MARTIN' ELUSIVE

Keyes Attempting to Get Data on Mystery Man in Aimee's Case

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12 (AP).—The footprints of "John Doe" Martin across the path of Aimee Semple McPherson today presented an elusive trail for district attorneys' investigators seeking a heretofore unidentified but important principal in the alleged kidnapping conspiracy.

The "footprints" were discovered by District Attorney Asa Keyes yesterday during the preliminary hearing on conspiracy charges for the Angelus Temple pastor, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy and Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman-Sieff. The blanket complaint which forms the basis for the conspiracy charges names four other defendants, one of whom is "John Doe." The identity of the anonymous conspirator was hinted at during the examination of Mrs. Wiseman, who had been called as a state's witness.

Mrs. Wiseman, who accused Mrs. McPherson as having hired and schooled her in a plot to refute insinuations that the evangelist sojourned at Carmel-by-the-Sea with Kenneth G. Ormiston, missing radio man, testified that she was first approached by a "Mr. Martin."

Attorney W. L. Gilbert, of Mrs. McPherson's defense counsel, objected to the mention of "Mr. Martin" on the grounds that no foundation had been laid to establish Martin as a co-conspirator.

"John Doe Martin's footprints are in this case somewhere," Keyes replied, "and if we don't prove it I will be willing for this testimony to be stricken from the record."

The witness was permitted to tell of her meeting with Martin, who, she said, was a stranger. He approached her in a San Francisco hotel lobby last July. He told her he had been referred to her and had a "little confidential work" for her to do.

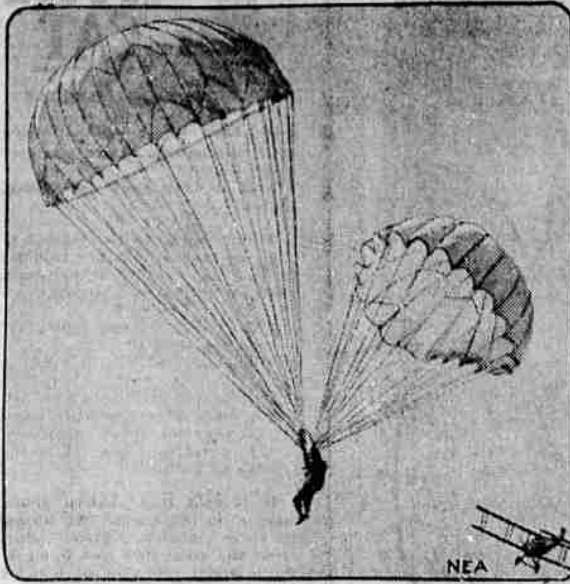
Relating to her conversation with Martin, Mrs. Wiseman declared that the stranger asked her to aid in "clearing" Mrs. McPherson of "this scandal at Carmel."

Holiday in Court

It was at Martin's suggestion that she came to Los Angeles and entered into the alleged conspiracy with Mrs. McPherson and her mother to produce "The Little Lady" who was to pose as Ormiston's Carmel companion and referred to by the radio man in an affidavit as "Miss X."

Taking advantage of today's court holiday, Mrs. McPherson planned to rest at the Seashore.

MOTHER AND SON REUNITED HERE

The police station—so often the scene of tragedy and woe—formed the setting for a joyful scene last night when a mother and her son were united after 21 years of separation.

Edward V. Vaughn, who landed here from Brooklyn, N. Y., yesterday only to find that the name he remembered as his mother's after her remarriage was unfamiliar in La Grande, found in Mrs. A. H. Cantrell the parent he had not seen since he was a lad of seven.

Newspaper Helped.

Mrs. Cantrell knew it was her son the minute she read the notice in last night's Observer, she declared this morning.

"I didn't even wait to finish reading the piece," she laughed as she recalled her excitement. "I knew he was looking for his mother, and I hurried right over to the police station, where the item said to call."

"Yes, I knew who he was as soon as I saw him. He favors my brother."

"He was tickled to see me too. We didn't go to bed until after 1 o'clock last night. And I never slept a wink after I did go."

Mrs. Cantrell and the boy's father were divorced at Ironwood, Pa., 21 years ago. The husband took the children, whom he was to bring to her sister's home for her to see whenever she wished. She went to Ohio to live, and the father moved the children so that she did not know where to find them.

Wilbur Praises Admiral Clark, Of the Oregon

BRADFORD, Vermont, Oct. 12 (AP).—Old records of the navy department were reopened here today by Secretary Wilbur to trace the sturdy patriotism that marked the life of Rear Admiral Charles Edgar Clark, under whose command the battleship Oregon surged over 15,000 miles of sea in 1898 to play her decisive role in the battle of Santiago.

Mr. Wilbur delivered the principal address at the dedication of a memorial statue to Admiral Clark in the town of his birth. He recalled that the valor and determination which marked the battle commander had appeared when a magazine exploded at the Mare Island navy yard in 1892 when 142 persons were killed and Commander Clark was among the first on the scene. In his report commander Clark told of smoke rising from an adjoining house stored with all kinds of explosives.

"I undertook to extinguish any fire inside with the other hose," he wrote. "Going inside, I was unable to discover any flames."
