

WOMAN, 50, DENIES KILLING HUSBAND

Mrs. Eva N. McGee, in Jail at Tillamook, Interviewed by Reporter

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Oct. 12 (AP)—Mrs. Eva N. McGee, white-haired woman of 50, who was arraigned yesterday on a charge of first degree murder in connection with the death Aug. 2 of her husband, Dr. W. G. McGee, today told, amid sobs, her side of the case.

Seated in a small office in the sheriff's department of the court house she emphatically denied to a staff representative of the Portland Telegram that there was any ground for the charge that she had poisoned her husband. She declared rumors that he was heavily insured were unfounded.

She said that after she had taken Dr. McGee's body to be buried at Montezuma, Wash., their former home, she heard that rumors were afloat, and later that the grand jury was investigating. She said she remained at home, expecting to be called to testify.

First Time in Court
"The only reason I am indicted is because the grand jury did not get my side of this case," she said. "This is the first time I have ever been in trouble, the first time I have ever been in a court as a defendant and I have no criminal record whatever. I am innocent of any wrongdoing."

Dr. McGee's death occurred after a week's illness, while he was staying at a hotel in Tillamook conducted by his wife. At that time he was recuperating from injuries suffered in an automobile accident. He had severe convulsions, and this fact, coupled with a remark that he made during an interval of consciousness, that incidentally he had taken tainted like poison, led to the investigation after his death. His stomach was examined by Dr. Robert L. Benson, of the University of Oregon medical college, and the indictment was based on the autopsy report.

Nearly Collapsed
When Mrs. McGee was taken to court yesterday she did not know of the charge against her, and she nearly collapsed when it was read. She wept bitterly, and told the sheriff she thought she was being subpoenaed to testify before the grand jury. That was fixed at \$2,000.

Donald McGee, 17-year-old son, is in Tillamook with his mother. A daughter resides at Coquille. A brother and sister were expected to arrive today from Montezuma.

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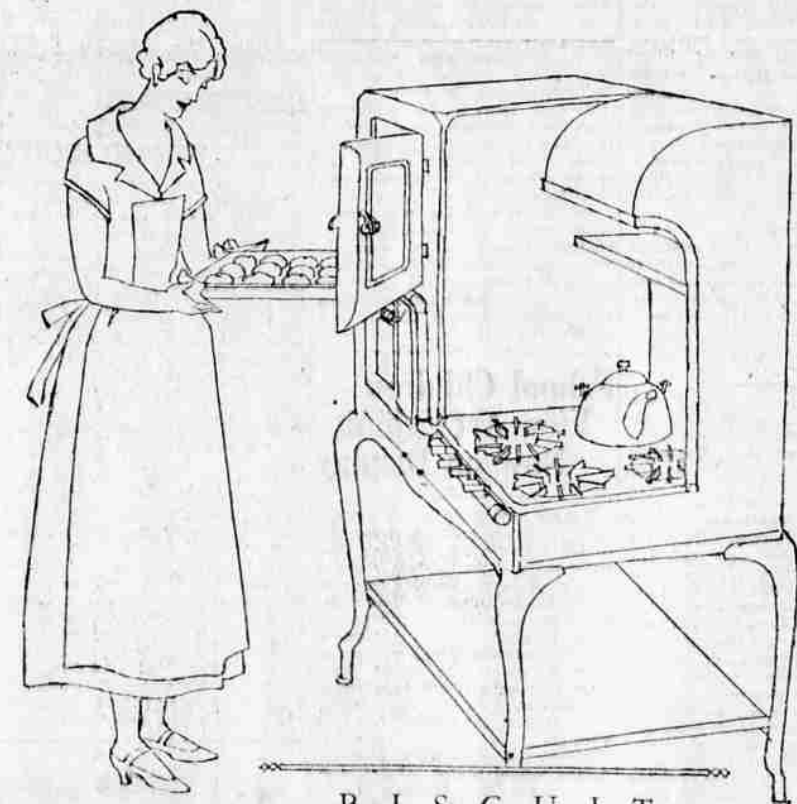

TAKE CARE OF YOUR CARBURETOR

The nose—the carburetor of the body!

Like the heart, the nose has no "time off", no relaxation during sleeping, but must function properly from birth to death—"every second" during life.

The mechanism of the nose is more wonderful than the carburetor on your automobile to which it corresponds. It must, first of all, filter the air intake and change it to proper density for entrance to the lungs. The air is cleaned of dust, germs and foreign material by coming in contact with hair-like "processes" which can be seen only under a microscope. They are located inside of cavities, called sinuses, back in the head and face. After filtering, causes temperature adjustment, the work of blood vessels. This is accomplished on the same principle as the hot spot on the intake manifold on a motor or the coils of a hot water heating system in a house.

In the nose the adjustment is automatic. No screws to turn in the case of the automobile carburetor! Instead the control is automatic—and actually is the nervous system, which governs the amount of blood sent to the membrane of the nose. The amount
