WHEAT CROP IS 19,586,000 BU.

Oregon's Total Yield Is
Less Than 20-Year
Average Mark

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12 (AP).—The very unusual cold spell of the latter part of September did quite a lot of damage to growing crops in some parts of the state, and practically none in other sections, said P. L. Kent, statistician, in a crop review today.

That portion of the Willamette valley lying to the northward of Salem practically escaped frost injury and over most of this area the most tender vegetation is still green. Elsewhere in the state all tender vegetation was generally killed and some damage from frocking of potatoes in the ground and apples on the trees is reported. Rainfall for the month of September at Portland was about 25 per cent in excess of the September normal. Most of the eastern portion of the state reports that there has not been sufficient rainfall for best fall seedling condition.

There was no change in the state wheat situation since the September report. Yields per acre of spring wheat are reported last month. The total Oregon wheat crop this year now looks like about 19,586,000 bushels, about 17,500,000 bushels of winter wheat, and 1,986,000 bushels of spring wheat. The 1925 total wheat crop was estimated at 17,500,000 bushels, the 1924 crop at 26,807,000 bushels and the five-year average at 20,832,000 bushels.

APPLE CROP HURT

WALLOWA, Ore., Oct. 12 (Special).—H. G. Masterson, of Elgin, was a business visitor in this section of the country the last of the week. Mr. Masterson reports a considerable amount of damage to apple crops in that section from the recent hard frosts.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12 (AP).—Fresh egg prices are sharply higher today in the local market, the long overdue advances pushing extras up 2c to the 47c level. First and current receipts are bidding 41 to 42c for henery receipts in the country.

The local butter market continues to display a weak undertone. No change has been announced in print prices and top grade cubes held steady on the exchange but firsts were posted a fraction lower at 35 1/2c.

Appeal Denied in Rail Foreclosure

CHICAGO, Oct. 12 (AP).—A petition of junior bondholders of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad, asking permission to appeal a recent federal court ruling denying them the right to intervene in the foreclosure suit against the road, was denied today by Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson.

The bond holders known popularly as the Jamison group and represented by Nathan L. Miller, former governor of New York, as chief counsel, plan to ask a writ of mandamus from the circuit court of appeals compelling submission of Judge Wilkerson's ruling to the appellate body for review.

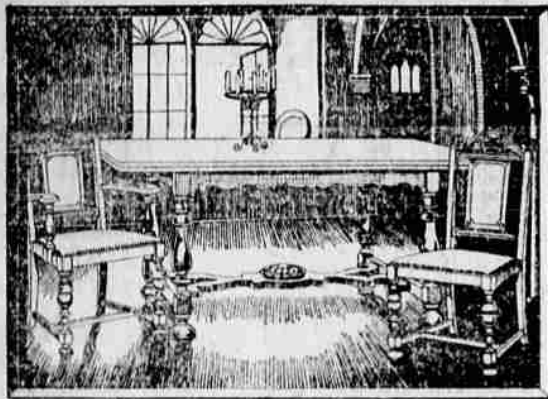

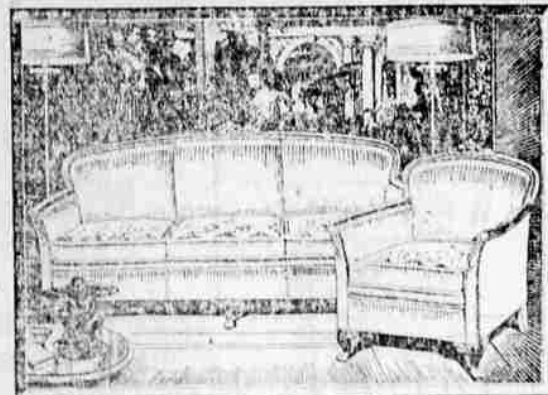

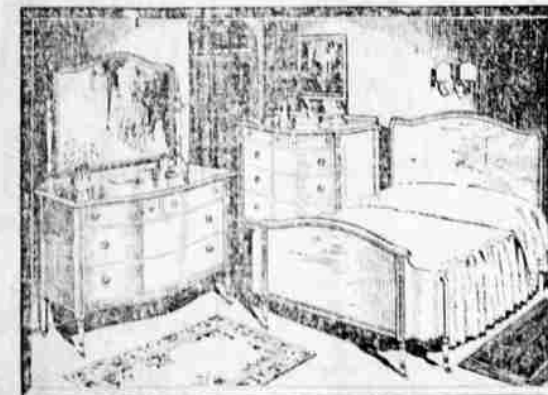

The Garden

LILIES FOR LATE SUMMER BLOOM

The safely gold-banded lily is famous for its large flowers of white with chocolate spots and a band of gold down each petal as well as for its delicious fragrance. The goldbanded lily is a late summer bloomer and comes as a striking accent. Illuminating shady corners in August and early September.

While it is not a long-lived bulb, considering its display, it is cheap enough to be worth replanting every two or three seasons. Deep planting is the chief essential for its success with shade for the soil about the stem. It delights to grow up among other perennials, close to the auratum in popularity, are the lance-leaved lilies of Japan, the speciosum type, of which Melpomene, white with deep crimson markings, Roseum, with lighter fleckings and the pure white Album are well known. They are longer-lived than auratum and often domesticate themselves.

During this lily planting season do not forget the old-fashioned tiger lily, one of the finest although neglected because it is common. The taller, brighter type, tigrinum splendens, is better than the old form and deserves wide planting. It is a fine garden subject. Planted with the steel blue of the globe thistles and sea hollies it makes a striking picture. The umbellatum lilies blooming in early June have all the brilliancy of the Oriental poppies and usually multiply freely and make the colonies. The Regal lily, liliun regale or myriophyllum, a comparative newcomer, is one of the really great plant novelties of recent years. A hardy Easter lily in shape, pure white within with a golden throat and a rose-colored outside, it is a striking garden plant. While the auratum lily does

not like a lime soil, which is one of the reasons for its short life, the Regal lily is not particular. It also likes shade at the roots and is at its best coming through lower-growing annuals or perennials. Its blooming season is in July. As it is easily raised from seed this lily is now being produced in quantity for our gardens.
