## Hornsby Buries Mother in Texas This Afternoon

ASTIN, Tex., Oct. 12 (AP)—A world's champion was just a hometown boy who had lost his dearest friend when Rogers Hornsby made ready today to bury his mother.

The plaudits of the multitude in the hour of a great triumph were dim and distant things as the manager of the victorious St. Louis Cardinals stood beside the bier of the woman who died before she learned of her son's success.

Feeling the personal emotions the residents of Astin made no outward demonstration but quietly, as neighbors sympathizing with a neighbor, passed by the coffin of Mrs. Hornsby.

Twenty-five years ago, Rogers, catching a baseball and hit stood at the bedside of his dying father. A grave in the little cemetery at Hornsby Road, nine miles from Astin, has been prepared as the final resting place of the mother who had her wish to see her son's team win the championship.

Funeral services conducted by the Rev. E. H. Minter pastor of the First Southern Presbyterian church, will be held at 2 o'clock.

## Car of Poultry Moved from Pasco

PASCO, Oct. 12.—The first car load of live poultry to be shipped from this part of the state was sent from Pasco Monday via Northern Pacific to Seattle. The car was shipped by the Columbia Valley Poultry company and was loaded from Wain Wain and Kennecott, beside Pasco. The regular poultry car will be used and it is said that about 1,500 chickens will be shipped. The load will be a mixed one, mostly spring eggs and broilers.

The Columbia Valley Poultry company entered the local scene some months ago and leased space in the cold storage plant of Church, Mig. co. They have done an extensive cream business. They have also been handling poultry and other produce. The outcome of the venture will be watched with much interest here. Poultry is being raised extensively on many places scattered as far as on the irrigated lands and the development of a year round market will fill a long felt need.

## OPTION TAKEN FOR AIRPLANE LANDING FIELD

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 12.—An option on a 20-acre tract immediately southeast of the race track at the state fair grounds has been secured through efforts of the Salem chamber of commerce and may be located and added to the airplane landing field now located to the south and southwest of the race track. It was stated by F. A. Elliott, of this city, speaking before the Salem Rotary club at the club luncheon at noon. "With this new piece added to our present landing field, and kept in first class condition all the year round, this city would have a field as good as any on the coast." Mr. Elliott declared.

"The state fair board has indicated its willingness to buy this field and add it to the other, making a good field that the city would be free to use, but owned by the fair board," he said. Governor Pierce has expressed his approval of the idea, although I don't believe in putting much faith in the promises of a politician.

"My opinion is that it would be a good idea for the city of Salem to buy this tract. Then we would have absolute ownership."

## CREDITS SINKING FUND TO WILSON

Democratic Pre-Election Statement Issued by the National Committee

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (AP)—The Democratic administration of Woodrow Wilson and the subsequent republican administrations are entitled to credit for the cumulative sinking fund, now under which \$740,552,550 already has been paid on the public debt due to the world war, the democratic national committee contended today in its latest pre-congressional election statement.

"The republicans in speeches and other publicity try to make it out that they are entitled to all credit for payments on the debt," the statement said, adding that the law was "enacted by a democratic congress and signed by President Wilson, March 2, 1917. Carter Glass, now senator from Virginia being then secretary of the treasury."

Total Payments Total payments on the public debt from ordinary means was \$2,747,825,829 to June 30 last the statement continued, this including in addition to the sinking fund payment of \$1,749,552,550 interest payments received on debts owed the U. S. by foreign countries approximately \$440,000,000 to that date.

"So that part of the debt payment," the statement said, "is merely administrative compliance with the provisions of a law the democrats with sound financial foresight, enacted." Payments on the public debt out of surpluses have amounted to \$2,021,407,901, the democratic declar-

"The application of surpluses to debt payments having begun in 1920, by a democratic administration the amount for that year being \$229,655,768."

Of the \$1,750,000,000 payments on the public debt by deductions in the net balance in the general fund, \$1,244,552,550 was in 1918-1926, during the Wilson administration. The statement asserted, adding that "reports of the secretary of the treasury showed a telling light on the efforts to make the people think the republicans are entitled to all the credit for payment of the public debt."

## Boarder Cow Is Found By Testing

COVALLER, Ore., Oct. 12.—Thirteen "boarders" said, cow "scraps" are disposed of, and two purchased tonight, is the summary of the Oregon cow testing association report for August as prepared by N. C. Jandson, dairyman of the county extension service. Much by night, these reports show that Oregon dairymen are shifting their herds about for improvement of stock. In the course of the year this process has wrought a great change for the better in Oregon dairy cattle, said E. B. Fitts of Penn State college, who judged dairy cattle at the state fair this year.

The report shows that 2664 cows were tested in the August association work. They average 44.4 pounds of milk carrying 23.44 pounds of butterfat. And 545 cows produced as much as 48 pounds of fat each, or more.

## Spokane Land Bank Has a New Officer

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 12.—H. H. Pugh, of Helena, Mont., a director of the Federal Land bank, has been elected an active vice president and will take charge of the new office Oct. 15. The position has just been created and Mr. Pugh will be the first active vice president of the bank. He has been an officer of the Live Stock Loan company of Helena and was elected a director of the land bank last December.

A. E. Shipstead, of Jerome, Idaho, director of the land bank, attended a meeting of the directors recently. "Business conditions as disclosed by the affairs of the bank are improving," said Mr. Shipstead. "Farmers are meeting their payments more promptly and some have made enough on their crop this year to pay off their entire loan. The old foreclosures that were handed down from earlier years have been pretty well cleared up and the affairs of the bank are in splendid condition."

## OKENBERG TENNIS CHAMP

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 12 (AP)—Roy Okenberg, of Salem, added another title to his long list when he defeated Homer New, of Portland, in the final singles match of the annual University of Oregon fall tennis tournament. Okenberg is acclaimed tennis champion of the university through his victories. The score of the match was 6-2, 6-1.

Okenberg is now center on the basketball team, and is the leading high of the university tennis team as well.

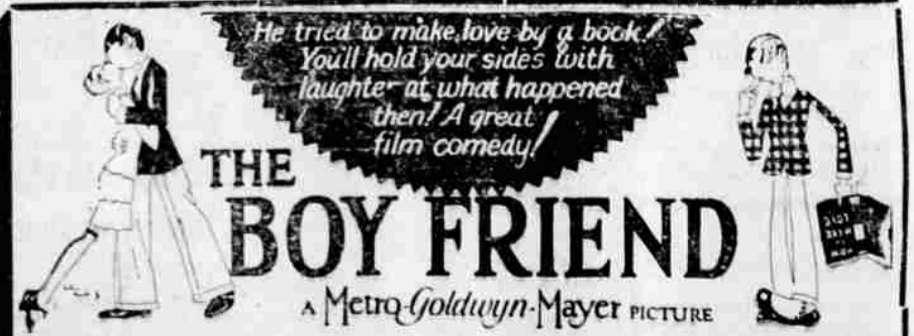
