ROCKFORD, Wash., Oct. 13—More than 500 people took advantage of special bargains offered by merchants for market day. Streets were lined with farmers' cars. It was a reminder of the crowds that thronged Rockford on similar occasions several years ago. The Inland Empire relations committee of the Spokane chamber of commerce was represented by a party headed by W. P. O'Brien, the principal speaker at the luncheon of the community association.
