May Ask Congress To Make Inquiry

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 14. (AP)—Announcing that with a view to securing "a congressional inquiry or an investigation by the federal department of justice or both" into the relations between the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, the American Telephone and Telegraph company and other associated companies, "I am taking the matter up with the governors of various states where telephone problems similar to our exist," Governor Pierce today addressed a letter to Alfred E. Clark, of Portland, authorizing Clark to "undertake a thorough investigation of the telephone company and its rates and methods of business in this state," and declared "I am going to do everything possible to provide you with the means and the organization with which to carry on a thorough investigation."

Three American Missionaries Safe

PEKING, Oct. 14. (AP)—The American consul at Chungking has informed the American legation that the three American missionaries captured by bandits in Hunan province on Oct. 3 have been rescued unharmed. The rescue was effected without the payment of any ransom. The missionaries released are: Miss Minerva Weil, and Karl H. Beck, of the Reformed Mission, and Miss Lydia Koebbe, of the Evangelical Mission. No details of the rescue were received.

Western Oregon Hunters Coming For Pheasants

PORTLAND, Oct. 14. (AP)—Hundreds of hunters were leaving Portland today for eastern Oregon to be on the ground for the first day of pheasant hunting. The season opens in Malheur county on Friday and runs 16 days. In other counties which have an open season on the birds, Sunday is the opening day and the season lasts eight days. Birds are more plentiful this year than ever before, according to E. F. Averill, state game warden. Malheur county is the best stocked district but there are also lots of pheasants in Umatilla, Union, Baker and Morrow counties. Shooting in the Willamette valley will also be good, however, Averill predicted.

Chicago Records 3 Earth Shocks

CHICAGO, Oct. 14. (AP)—Three distinct earthquake shocks were registered on the United States weather bureau seismograph here in the 24 hours ending at 8:59 a. m. today.

The second shock recorded, continuing from 1:13 p. m. to 5:20 p. m. yesterday was called "serious" by officials. It was at an estimated distance of 4,000 miles.

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governor in the resolution were:

1—That he "willfully disregarded his oath to respect and guide the rights of legislative and judicial branches of the state when he sought to compel the legislature to accept his arbitrary plan to dismember and disorganize the entire educational system of the state."

2—That he has "betrayed the people of the state and has willfully and maliciously sought to wrest the legislative power from duly elected representatives of the people in the legislature assembled."

3—That he has "unlawfully and shamelessly attempted to obtain personal control of our boards of regents and our entire state school system."

4—That he is "justly charged in his inordinate lust for political power with violating the moral and judicial legal intent of his constitutional oath when he nullified the authority of his office and stooped to the lowest political device of appointing members of the legislature to lucrative positions under the state government during his flight to obtain personal control thereof."

HARTLEY SPEAKS

OLYMPIA, Wash., Oct. 14. (AP)—A statement issued here today by Governor Roland Hartley said: "A vast majority of the people of this state favor honest, clean government. The people want their affairs efficiently, honestly and economically administered. I pledged just that kind of an administration when I sought the governorship and I have faithfully tried to fulfill that obligation."

"The only question involved in all this controversy is whether or not the business of this state shall be conducted in the interest of all the people or for the benefit of a favored few."

STODDARD NAMES ARMORY BOARD

Committee Plans to Begin Intensive Campaign Immediately

Every member of every organization in this region that cooperates in the campaign for the support of the armory measure will be visited personally before election day if a plan formulated last night by the newly appointed committee is carried out. A representative of each civic and fraternal body will be held responsible for the educational campaign among his own members.

Elmer Stoddard, chairman of the committee authorized at Tuesday night's gathering of 23 organizations, immediately on his appointment named the following men to assist him: A. J. Stange, R. R. Huron, Hugh E. Brady, Charles H. and Earl C. Reynolds.

The measure authorizes bonding to the extent of \$25,000 to match when added to the \$12,000 already in the fund, a state appropriation up to \$40,000 for the erection of an armory in La Grande. The county commissioners, individually and unofficially, have expressed their willingness to include a part of the sum to be raised in the next year's budget.

The bonds would be paid off by a city tax, the amount of which, it is estimated, would not exceed 35 cents for each \$100 of city taxes now paid.

The La Grande Neighborhood club is one of the larger women's organizations supporting the measure. Three members represented the club at the meeting Tuesday evening.
