AGGIES' HOPES MOUNT BEFORE GAME IN SOUTH

Defeat by St. Mary's Turns Dope Against Golden Bear "11"

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 15 (AP)—Pacific coast conference football eleven competing for recognition in the annual drama of gridiron supremacy, take their places again tomorrow with another character added to the already imposing cast of performers.

California, engaged last week in the madstrom of a 24-7 defeat opens its conference season at Berkeley tomorrow with the hope of retrieving some of the glory lost in the St. Mary's game. With the powerful Oregon Aggies in the opposing role, however, observers feel that the Golden Bears have had a remote chance of keeping their conference state unblemished.

The Aggies in winning one conference game and two preliminary clashes to date, have allowed but six points to be scored against them.

Idaho Dangerous Idaho and Washington, both flushed with conference victories last week, clash at Seattle, and while general opinion favors Washington because of its 1925 championship winning feat, however, the element of uncertainty is injected because of the Vandals' apparent but untested strength.

Washington State college is expected to have a fairly easy time in disposing of Montana in the third of the conference tilt. The Grizzlies proved to be easy victims in the two conference starts, while W. E. C., although defeated by University of Southern California last week, displayed a hard and veritable attack.

Stanford Plays Nevada Stanford and Nevada meet in the former stadium in an engagement which has no conference bearing but is attracting considerable interest because of the possible outcome. Nevada, with a fast and well balanced eleven is conceded a chance by some critics to turn in a victory for the first time in years. The University of Southern California 'Prophets' are expected to have an easier time with Occidental.

George Burns, Cleveland, Wins Year's Honors in American League

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (AP)—Thirteen is no flax for George Burns slugging first baseman of the Cleveland Indians.

a committee of baseball writers picked the thirteenth of October to vote him the 1926 award as the most valuable player in the American league. Incidentally, two times 13 players were included in the balloting from which the names of Cobb, Speaker, Collins, Sider, Ruth, Johnson and Peckinpaugh were eliminated because they were chosen in other years. Burns, however, led the field by a wide margin. Most of Chicago rating his closest rival with half as many votes. Burns topped his year's playing with the Indians by collecting 64 year of major baseball to pound out an alltime hitting record and
