"Rose of World" At Sherrys Treat for Fans

There is every reason why every picture fan should thoroughly enjoy "Rose of the World," the Warner Bros. Classic of the Screen which opened yesterday at the Sherry Theatre.

First of all there is glowing, dark-eyed Patsy Ruth Miller in the title role of "Rose of the World," a heroine such as only Kathleen Norris, the noted novelist, can create; and a role ideally suited to Miss Miller's restrained emotional acting.

Then there is the supporting cast that is one of the finest assembled in any movie season. Alan Forrest plays the likeable hero who is ruled by three women, but later rules his own life. Little Pauline Curran is his selfish, ambitious wife, temporarily deserting her famous flapper roles in most effective fashion. Rockliffe Fellowes is the villainous husband of the heroine, and Alec Francis gives one of his inimitable characterizations as her grandfather. Helen Dunbar plays the scheming mother of the hero, and Lydia Knott the genteel poor mother of the heroine. Barbara Landry, Carrie Clark Ward and Edward Plot, Jr., also give admirable performances in lesser roles.

"3 Bad Men" On Last Time Saturday Night

A fascinating page from history brought to life is the story of "3 Bad Men," Fox Film epic, which will have its last appearance at the Arcade theatre Saturday.

Directed by John Ford of "The Iron Horse" fame, with Olive Thorne Miller, the wise heroine, and George O'Brien as the youthful pioneer, and a cast of such outstanding actors as J. P. McGuire, Donald, Tom Santschi and Frank Campbell in the title roles, this is one picture that more than comes up to expectations. Easily one of the principal characters is portrayed by a well known screen favorite, including Lou Tellegen, as the smooth but villainous gambler, Alec B. Francis as the minister, and Otis Harlan as the mirth-provoking printer.

The story deals with the opening of the free land in the Dakotas for settlement. 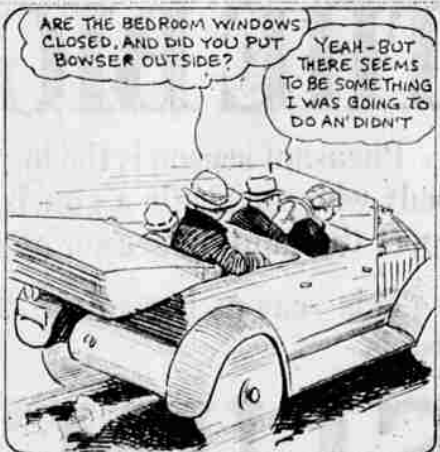

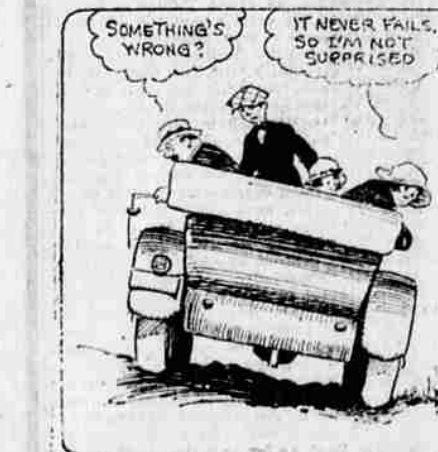
