STOCKS DROP IN SELLING ORGY

Price Decline Includes
Standard Rail and Industrial Issues

NEW YORK, Oct. 15. (By the Associated Press).—A formidable selling movement swept over the stock market today as speculative weakness was aroused by predictions of slackening business and the latest epidemic of competitive price cutting in the motor industry. Standard Rail and industrial issues as well as the more speculative shares, were thrown on the market in large volume with price declines in the most active stocks ranging from 5 to an extreme of more than 15 points.

A break of 5 points in U. S. Steel carried it to the lowest price on the current movement, around 128½. Similar declines were recorded by Baldwin, Pullman, Hudson Motors, Woodworth and Atlantic Coast Line, while commercial Solvents "R." Dupont and U. S. East Iron Pipe sold 8 to 12½ points lower in the early afternoon.

As the selling movement gained headway, numerous stop loss orders were uncovered and there were indications of considerable distress selling.

Closing Weak
The close was weak. Baffles on steel and short coverings were short lived and another batch of selling orders depressed the market. Motor and equipment issues in the final hour, Atlantic Coast Line dropped over 7 points to around 192, some 76 points below the year's high, and declines of 5 to 6 points were registered by General Asphalt, Postum Cereal, Atlantic Refining and Case Trenching Machine.

Total sales approximated, 2,300,000 shares.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Oct. 15 (AP).—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The demand for wool has been continued almost as strong as a week ago, in spite of the intervention of the holiday and prices are fully up to last week's level and occasionally slightly higher. Altogether, the market buoyant, in view of the keen demand for quick shipments and for no small quantities of wool. The hand-month buying policy on the part of the New York goods trade gives evidence of having been overdone, in view of the present rush to buy wool."

"The foreign markets are generally firm, so far as the primary markets are concerned and the secondary markets, except for England, where the coal strike still overshadows the situation, are active and firm as a rule. Continental buyers, as well as Japanese, and to some extent, on the best goods, America, are active in Australia."

"The mohair market is rather quiet here but steady."

Wheat in Setback After Early Rally

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (By the Associated Press).—After opening ½ to ¾¢ up, Chicago wheat values reacted a little and then rose higher than before. Corn and oats were easy, corn starting unchanged, ½¢ advance but later sagging ½¢ to ¾¢. Provisions tended up, grade.

Wheat closed nervous, ½ to ¾¢ net lower; corn ½ to 1½¢ down; oats at ¼ to ½¢ decline to a shade advance, and provisions unchanged to ½¢ higher.

FIVE MEN WILL HELP ENFORCE U. S. DRY LAWS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 (AP).—Appointment of five zone superintendents who will serve as liaison officers between the prohibition forces in the field and headquarters here was announced today by Assistant Secretary Andrews, chief of the dry forces. They include John E. Cooper, of Healdsburg, Cal., Pacific zone.

The officers were created by General Andrews and complete the organization of the prohibition army so far as it is possible under existing laws.

"The duty of these officers," Andrews explained, "is to keep in intimate touch with conditions in their district and keep me informed. This action does not relieve administrators of their responsibility in the least. The bootlegging industry has developed into a big business with its lawyers, informers, bribers and what not. We have the brains and now we have the machine to go after and break up these big illegal organizations."

HEALTH

INFANTILE PARALYSIS

(By Samuel Kleinberg, M. D., New York.)

Member Gorgas Memorial Institute. Infantile paralysis is a disease of the nervous system resulting frequently in paralysis of the muscles of the legs, arms, back and abdomen. It occurs most frequently in the summer and fall, and at all ages, though the large majority of the patients are children.

There are some new cases every year, but sometimes, as in 1907 and in 1915, the disease comes in epidemics affecting many thousands. We are not quite sure of the exact cause, though it is reasonably certain that the disease is due to a very minute germ.

Scientific medicine is thoroughly familiar with the course of infantile paralysis and can prevent many of the after effects.

Deformities of the back, hips, knees, ankles and hands often can be prevented by early and careful treatment. This disease requires, in most cases, a great deal of attention, even under the most favorable circumstances. It is necessary to do everything possible to prevent avoidable deformities.

Knowledge of this disease enables us to help practically every case, no matter how severe the deformity or of how long a duration. By means of massage, muscle training, various types of splints and a host of specially designed operations, most patients can be improved and aided in becoming independent and self-reliant, as far as sitting, walking and ordinary duties are concerned.

The most difficult problems arise for those who live at some distance from big cities, who have permitted deformities to continue for months and years without treatment. Today no patient suffering from infantile paralysis should be considered hopeless.

By the use of a brace, crutch, or an operation, a child with a complete paralysis of a limb from the hip to the toes, a so-called "dangle limb," can be made to walk. A person with a paralyzed arm can surely be improved by muscle training, tendon operations, etc. A child with a paralyzed back and curvature of the spine can be markedly improved in muscle power and posture so that he can get about comfortably by the use of corsets, exercises or by operations.

Do not decide from hearsay or upon neighbor's advice that your child cannot be helped. Make sure before you permit a crippled child to go through life under a handicap that can be lightened.

Fresh Gains in Egg Prices Are Chalked Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 15 (AP).—Fresh gains in local egg prices has brought extras up to the 50¢ level and placed this market more in line with other coast cities and the eastern outlet. Bids on the dairy exchange are a cent higher today in all grades but pinks and pownes. Firsts now posted at 44¢ and current receipts at 42¢, while small eggs held steady at former levels.

Storage holdings throughout the country are being steadily reduced as production falls off.

Receipts of fresh country stock in the local market are hardly sufficient to meet requirements.

A cent advance in standard cubes to 41½¢ is the only change in the local butter market for the day. Offerings are still fairly liberal with 14,537 pounds received yesterday from country creameries.

A quiet tone continues to rule in live poultry and country meats. Receipts are not large but houses have a hard time moving daily arrivals. Prices are generally unchanged.

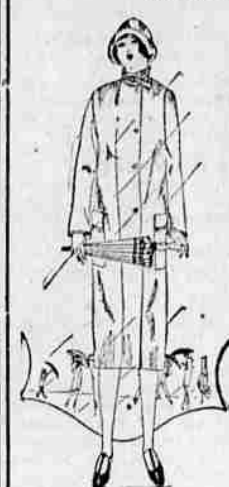
