Synod Officer Is Here With Sermon For First Church

Dr. Thompson, Presbyterian Executive, Will Be One of Three Pulpit Guests.

Dr. D. A. Thompson, of Portland, executive for the synod of Oregon, who will speak in the morning at the Presbyterian church, is one of three guests announced for La Grande pulpits Sunday. E. A. Sayre, superintendent of county schools, will deliver the morning sermon at the Methodist church, and the Rev. Harry Munsey, a student at the Moody Bible institute, will speak in the evening.

First of a series of illustrated lectures to be given monthly by Dr. Henry W. Parker, pastor, leads interest to the evening announcement from the First Methodist church.

Methodist Church South. Mr. Munsey, who will speak at 7:30 p. m. is a native of Tennessee and a distant relative of the late William Munsey, famous pulpit orator. He came here about a month ago from Chicago to marry Miss Ethel Webster, a La Grande girl who returned from the Moody Bible institute. The Rev. J. A. Hall, pastor of the Methodist church, performed the ceremony. Now Mr. Munsey and his bride are preparing to return to Chicago.

Mr. Sayre is scheduled to address the congregation at 11 a. m. Sunday school will be at 9:45 o'clock.

Epworth league will have a session at 6:30 p. m. prayer meeting will be held at the church.

First Presbyterian. Dr. Thompson's message at 11 o'clock in the morning will be supplemented by music. The quartet, directed by Mrs. A. L. Richardson, will sing "Peace I Leave With You" by Roberts.

Sunday school will be at 9:45 a. m. Junior Christian Endeavor society will meet at 4 p. m. and the Intermediate society, at 6:15. "These groups are among new members weekly and their enthusiasm is an object lesson for adults," the Rev. William Crosby Ross, pastor, says of them.

First Methodist Episcopal. John S. Hodgins, La Grande attorney, will address the Marghita class on "Money, the Law and the Bible" at the Bible school hour at 9:45 a. m. The Men's Forum will meet at the same hour.

At 7:30 p. m. the minister will deliver the illustrated lecture entitled "A Motor Trip in the Congo Country." These pictures are supplied through the world service commission of the church. There will be no charge other than the usual offering. Special music will be supplied by the quartet.

First Baptist. "What's the Use of Preaching?" the Rev. George Albert Pollard, pastor, says will be the subject for his sermon Sunday morning. His theme for the little folk is "The X-Boy." Sunday school will be at 9:45 a. m.

BAKING SODA HARMFUL IN CASES OF DYSPEPSIA

The habit of taking common baking soda, with its resultant temporary relief in cases of so-called dyspepsia, has, in a vast number of instances, done more harm than good. This is true because of the neglect occasioned in having early recognition made of the true state of the disease.

Dyspepsia, as most people believe, is not a disease of the stomach, primarily. The symptoms are very often the result of disorders in other parts of the body. The stomach is secondarily affected in most cases, and in order to treat the condition properly the cause must be accurately determined.

Symptoms, few or many, may consist of heartburn, belching, nausea, vomiting, loss of appetite and actual pain of moderate or severe degree.

Now as a matter of fact such symptoms may be the result of influences on the nervous system. For example, anxiety, fear, worry, mental strain or exhaustion, directly or through the medium of certain glands, may be responsible.

On the other hand, diseases in other organs, as well as in the stomach proper may be guilty. Many digestive complaints have their primary origin in the intestinal, liver and gall tracts. Some may be traced to tuberculosis, tonsils, adenoids, or teeth. In fact the origin of the disturbance, which seems to come from the stomach, may be located in any remote organ.

It is also true that dyspeptic symptoms may result from disease within the stomach itself, and this may occur from catarrh, inflammation, ulceration, growth, muscle weakness or displacement. When these conditions occur, the cure is, of course, more difficult to attain.
