One of the most delightful, well-balanced, easy-moving comedies the screen has offered for a long time is "The Waning Sex," the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer picture starring Norma Shearer, which comes to the Star theater Wednesday and Thursday, with Conrad Nagel as leading man.

Two girls and a man are the focal points of the plot. One of the girls wants him but doesn't love him, the other, the heroine, loves him but doesn't want him because she's not quite sure of her own mind.

Mary McAllister has the role of the "other girl," and George K. Arthur, Charles McHugh, Tiny Ward and Martha Mattox are also in the cast.

Comedy showing "He Done His Best"

"Old Soak" Will Show at Arcade This Week

The difficulties of filming Don Marquis' play, "The Old Soak," the film version of which comes to the Arcade theatre Wednesday and Thursday because of the varying censorship restrictions in various cities and states were overcome in quite novel fashion by Edward Blomman, who directed the picture.

Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kansas and Iowa are the most difficult states in which to make a picture through the censorship bodies. Those states, as well as many others, have a long list of taboos which directors and screen writers must watch carefully.

Canada has still another set of censorship restrictions. The state of New York has many prohibitions which are quite permissible even in Pennsylvania.

One of the favorite taboos of almost every censorship board, however, is that scenes showing anyone drinking on the screen. This is not permitted in more than half the states in the Union, and naturally it put quite a handicap on the filming of a picture of this type, for the entire story has to do with the adventures of kindly, lovable old toper.

Stoman, the director, and Charles Kenyon, the scenario writer who adapted the story, have gotten around the censorship restrictions quite cleverly, and incidentally, enhanced the entertainment value of the story in doing it.

In the entire picture, no one is ever seen taking a drink, although scenes of false starts are made. The supporting cast includes George Lewis, June Marlowe, George Seligmann, Louise Fazenda, Gertrude Astor, William V. Mong, Lucy Beaumont, Adda Gleason, Tom Ricketts and others.

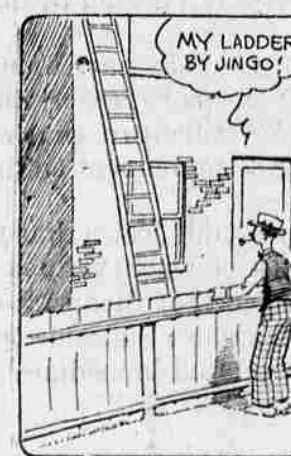
