WHEAT ASCENDS; CLOSE IS FIRM

Chicago and Winnipeg Markets Both Record Price Advance

CHICAGO, Oct. 19 (By the Associated Press).—Starting 1/2 to 1c higher, Chicago wheat prices continued to ascend. Corn and oats were also firmer, corn opening at 1/2 to 3/4c gain and subsequently reaching a further advance. Provisions tended to sag.

Wheat closed firm, 1 1/2 to 2c higher; corn 1/2 to 3/4c up; oats unchanged to 1/4c up and provisions unchanged to 2c down.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 19 (AP).—Wheat for October delivery had advanced 5 1/2c a bushel since Saturday on the Winnipeg grain exchange today. The rise on this delivery today by noon was 2 1/2c, and for other deliveries 1 1/2 to 2 1/2c.

Dressed Veal in Bad Slump; Drop Is Not Explained

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 19 (AP).—Country dressed veal are in a bad slump along the street. Commission houses were offering choice light calves as low as 15c today, but there were no buyers. Receipts are not heavy but the meager arrivals are not moving out.

Some firms still have Monday's receipts hanging in the cooler.

No explanation for the slump, other than a season falling off in consumption forthcoming.

Best calves today were quoted at 15 to 15 1/2c, but holders admitted that they would cut prices later in the day rather than to allow accumulations.

Country killed hogs are not influenced by the stagnant tone in veal. Very little pork is coming and good hogs are moving out promptly at 18 1/2 to 19c.

The poultry market is generally steady, with a good call for hens and good dressed turkeys. Springs are moving slowly.

Eggs prices continue on upward trend with firsts and current receipts a cent higher today at 47 and 44 cents respectively. Other grades held steady and unchanged, with extras at the 51c level.

Butter quotations are unchanged.

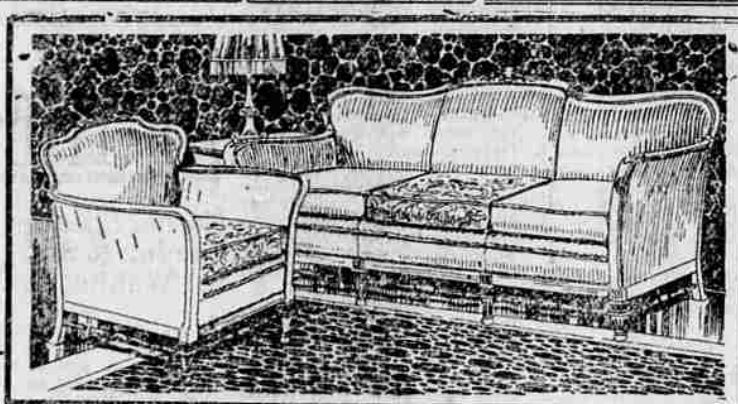

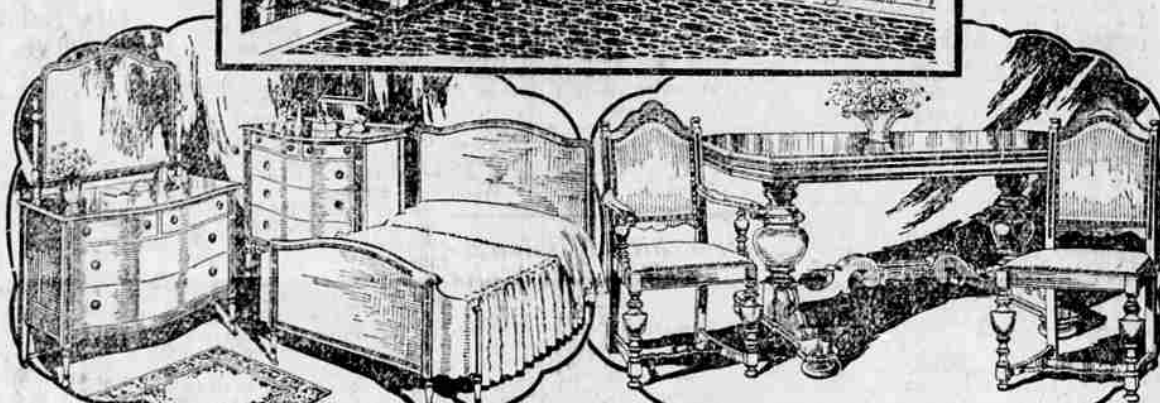
