1,500 ATTEND
LECTURE BY
'KID' JUDGEBenjamin Barr Lindsey
Speaks of Youth and
UnderstandingPARENTS MUST BE
RIGHT, HE ASSERTS"Respect the Kids' Law
and They Will Respect
Yours," Is Advice of
Jurist.

Fifteen hundred persons crammed the auditorium of the L. D. S. tabernacle, crowded its balcony to the doors, and overflowed into the church, the choir loft and the corridors last night to see and hear Benjamin Barr Lindsey, the famous "kid-judge" of Denver, Colo., in a lecture on "Why Kids Lie."

A small man, unimposing on the platform, with a creak in his voice and not the best delivery in the world. But he commanded their respect and attention for nearly two hours while he pleaded the cause of the boys and the girls.

Speaks of Youth.
Youth is changing—he never intimated that his ways are, but the ways of youth in every generation—and it is the business of parents and society, he maintains, to try to keep up.

"The boys and girls are using their heads and their freedom as never before," Judge Lindsey declared. "If we don't go with them, they will go without us. I'm for going with them—hanging together so that we won't hang separately."

Introduced by Knowles
"The man who has done more for the boys and girls than any other person, collection of persons or agency," Judge J. W. Knowles described the famous jurist in introducing him to the audience in behalf of the Parent-Teacher association which sponsored his coming. The introduction followed an ovation of two happily-received selections, a march and a trot, by the La Grande municipal band, J. P. Caldwell leading.

"Understanding" was the key Judge Lindsey offered to a situation that he declares demands the study and attention of not only parents, schools, churches and courts but all society—understanding of the child heart, the child-world's code, and the relation of childhood to the rest of humanity.

Cites Cases From Life.
He linked a score of round little sermons to incidents related from his 27 years experience as a juvenile judge. The sermons opened his hearers' minds to the responsibilities of a new age. The stories revealed how close to youth is the heart of the 52-year-old judge."I pity the parent or the teacher who tries to judge children unless he can remember his own childhood," he said.
"Put a pin in this thought: It is a bad thing to call a boy or a girl bad until you have tried something else hard; it is a bad thing to call a boy or a girl a liar until you have tried something else hard. There is no artistry like the human artistry."Four Causes Lies.
Children lie because they are afraid, Judge Lindsey's experience has told him.
"Lift the spell of fear with charity and love. Fight evil more than people, and especially more than children. Inspire children with confidence in you by having confidence in them. Put yourselves on a basis with them that will make them come to you first when they have done something wrong."
"Appeal to the boys and girls through loyalty and pride."
"Respect the kids' law, and they will respect yours. They have a keen sense of justice."
"Our law doesn't give way to theirs. It won't have to if we bend."

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20. (AP)—Louis R. Bean, of Lane county, was unanimously selected by the republican state central committee today to succeed Thomas K. Campbell as candidate for public service commissioner. Bean already is candidate for state senator from Lane county.

Campbell recently resigned from his candidacy for reelection on account of ill health.
The nomination of Bean was made by E. C. Judd, committee man from Clatsop county, and was seconded by Harold Warner, of Umatilla county, E. E. Baughard, of Josephine, and Joseph Roke, of Lane.J. W. McCulloch was nominated by R. H. McHaley, of Grant county, and seconded by A. G. Steinhilber, of Marion, but when the vote showed Bean 17 and McCulloch 2, McHaley moved that the election be made unanimous.
A state traffic officer dispatched by Secretary of State Kizer left immediately for Salem with the certificate of the nomination so that correction of the official ballots can be made in accordance with it.

HALL OF JUSTICE, Los Angeles, Oct. 20. (AP)—The defense of Aimee Semple McPherson when the evangelist stated, which will be presented in all sections, was in full swing when the conspiracy hearing of the Angelus Temple pastor was resumed in municipal court here today.

Mrs. McPherson, much improved after considerable pain, yesterday from an abscessed knee, said that 67 witnesses already had been subpoenaed in an attempt to tear down the mountain of evidence piled up by the state during more than three weeks of the preliminary trial.

The wrists of Mrs. McPherson were bruised; bore marks of having been bound by "ropes" when C. E. Cross visited the evangelist in a Douglas hospital a few hours after her reappearance June 23 last. Cross testified here today.

Didn't See Wrist Watch
Cross also declared the evangelist was not wearing a wrist watch when he saw her at the hospital. The prosecution attached considerable significance to the

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Trunk Mystery
Unearthed By
Portland Boy, 15

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20. (AP)—A trunk murder mystery of many strange ramifications developed here this afternoon when Charles Withers, 15-year-old Benson polytechnic student, found the body of his mother, Mrs. Beata Withers, crammed into a closed trunk in the attic of their home.

Murder appeared to be the only explanation of how the body got there and although police were talking about the possibility of suicide.

The body was at the bottom of the trunk. Over it was a layer of clothing. Next came the tray, filled with articles. Over all the trunk lid was down.

Mail Carrier in
Automobile Wreck

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 20.—Lady Luck frowned on L. A. Fuller, mail carrier of La Grande last Saturday morning then relented and saved his life, according to Deputy Sheriff Charles Hoskins. Mr. Fuller Saturday morning was driving to Portland after his mail, and he was the first of several sharp curves near Nollin. His heavy car turned over landing bottom side up across the road pinning Mr. Fuller underneath with the door across his neck slowly strangling him. Timely arrival of Deputy Sheriff Hoskins and a companion saved his life. The victim's face was turning black, the deputy sheriff said when they arrived. They managed to hold the car high enough to prevent strangulation and with the aid of four men happening along shortly after managed to extricate Mr. Fuller. He was able to return to La Grande suffering cuts and bruises and a badly wrenched arm.

GUNS WELCOME
RUMANIAN QUEENRoyal Party Visits U. S.
Naval Academy and
Baltimore Today

BALTIMORE, Oct. 20. (AP)—Under skies that frowned on royalty and commoner with equal impartiality, Queen Marie of Rumania ended a 65-mile auto trip over rain-washed roads from Washington and Annapolis at 12:55 p. m. today.

ANAPOLIS, Md., Oct. 20. (AP)—Booming of guns, from the seaway, welcomed Queen Marie and her royal Rumanian entourage to Annapolis and the U. S. Naval academy at 10:30 o'clock today. The party had traveled 49 miles over rain-swept roads from Washington under escort of a troop of Maryland state police. The entourage proceeded directly to the home of Rear Admiral Louis M. Nulton, academy superintendent.

At Annapolis, the party will inspect the U. S. Naval academy. After the inspection, the entourage will continue by automobile to Baltimore. Late in the afternoon it will board a special train at Baltimore for New York.

On arrival at New York the state department will relinquish supervision over the arrangements for the reception in the United States and the remainder of her trip over the country will be under the queen's own management. Marie prefaced her departure from the nation's capital with the announcement of two last-minute changes in plans for her American tour.

California Won't See Queen
The gorgeous diademed queen, who graced last night the first royal banquet ever held in the white house, let it be known through a spokesman that she will not visit California as planned originally, and that press representatives will be barred from her trip because of her desire for privacy.

Colonel John H. Carroll, general at counsel of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, in charge of her itinerary, said difficulties with the Southern Pacific railroad, which refused to grant a rate of \$1.00 for transporting her special train over its lines, were responsible for the elimination of San Francisco and Los Angeles and other California cities from her route.

The latest version of Queen Marie's itinerary, revised to eliminate all California points, substitutes for the Golden Gate swing, a trip from Spokane through Glacier national park and Billings, Mont., to Denver, and sets forward by eight days her arrival at all points to be visited on her way back across the continent.

Canadian Tour Unchanged
It also adds short stops to be made Oct. 25 at West Point, Albany and Syracuse, N. Y. The Canadian tour remains unchanged except that the queen expects on Nov. 5 or 6 to visit Victoria, British Columbia, as well as Vancouver.Queen Marie
Likes American
Cigarettes

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20. (AP)—The diamond crown worn upon shingled and permanently waved locks is not the only sign of modern femininity displayed by Marie, queen of Rumania, for she smokes American cigarettes and likes them and, furthermore, sees no harm in the use of a lip stick to enhance her royal good looks.

So declared her spokesman, the lady in waiting, Madame Simone Lachovary, in answering questions today of reporters. Madame Lachovary describes a queen who is modern and human—feminine as well as regal.

"Yes, the queen smokes a few cigarettes daily, although she is by no means an inveterate smoker," she said. "She does not permit the princess Ileana to smoke."

"We have brought some Rumanian cigarettes with us, but the queen has also smoked some American brands, and likes them very much," she added.

"She never uses rouge," continued the vivacious Madame Lachovary. "Although she sees no harm in the occasional use of a lip stick, her color is entirely natural."

Survey Reveals
Cold Protection
Difficult Matter

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 20. (AP)—Dr. William H. Barrow, medical adviser to men at Stanford university, revealed today the result of a survey he has made respecting the causes of colds which runs counter to many of the established notions regarding those universal afflictions.

"You can sleep in the open air, change from a hot to a cold climate, take a cold bath every morning and refuse to heat your house, or you can keep your bedroom airtight, take hot baths and wear your rubbers when it rains, and it will not lessen or increase your chances of catching a cold," says the medical adviser.

Women Less Susceptible
The only precaution one can take, Dr. Barrow says, is to belong to the feminine gender, for women are less susceptible to colds than men.

The report is based on questionnaires sent to 2,500 students. The result coincides with the outcome of a survey made at Cornell university in 1924 by Dr. D. F. Smiley.

Campaign in N. Y.
Becoming Heated

NEW YORK, Oct. 20. (AP)—The candidates for governor and United States senator on the republican and democratic tickets are approaching the "short and ugly war" stage in their stump speeches.

At Syracuse last night, Governor Smith said his republican opponent, Congressman Ogden L. Mills, was using "false figures" in discussing the state's finances, and added that his language was "not that of a cultured son of an old aristocratic family, but the cheap side street, mud gutter expressions that you expect in a cheap campaign."

Mr. Mills at Rochester, averred that the governor's outline of his plan of state water power development was "full of half truths, mis-statements and exhibiting generally a most lamentable inadequate study of the question."

Apple Growers
Will Petition
For Less Rate

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 20. (AP)—Apple growers of Oregon and Washington will meet at Olympia, Wash., Saturday, Oct. 23, to consider a petition to the U. S. C. asking a reduced freight rate on apples shipped east, so the big crop of the two states may be moved.

Railroad to Use
Roller Bearings

NEW YORK, Oct. 20. (AP)—Sleeping cars of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway are to be equipped with roller bearings, officials have announced.

If the passengers who use the \$2,000,000 of rolling stock so equipped find their berths more comfortable as a result, coaches and freight cars may be similarly equipped later, it is said.

Railroad men believe roller bearings will reduce the jerking of passenger trains and make possible longer freight trains.

MIAMI FEARS
STORMS MAY
COME AGAINHurricane Hits Havana—
Course May Carry it
Across Florida150 HOMES RAZED
IN CUBA DISTRICTSWind Increasing, Driving
Rain Begins—Fears of
Population Steadily
Growing.

HAVANA, Cuba, Oct. 20. (AP)—Havana was struck by the West Indian hurricane early today, the wind reaching from 120 to 130 miles an hour. The streets were flooded and littered with debris of all kinds.

The storm left Cuba headed northeast and it was indicated that the storm was traveling at about 10 miles an hour toward Key West. It was believed that it will take about eight hours for the storm to get to Key West.

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 20. (AP)—More than 150 homes were demolished in the Viera and Jessa Del Monte residential sections of Havana today by the hurricane which swept through the western part of Cuba, according to the local Cuban consulate.

The announcement was made at 11 o'clock following cables received from Luis Poyo, acting in the name of Domingo Milford, Cuban consul and the Cuban telephone company.

Chief of Police H. Leslie Quigg at noon ordered every policeman in Miami on duty to swell storm developments and stationed relief men at strategic points to render aid if necessary. The doors of the jail were thrown open to prisoners who are heads of families to protect their homes in the event the hurricane strikes here. The men were released on their honor to return after the emergency had passed.

Shortly before noon a driving rain swept across the bay and over the city. Many homes have been repaired only slightly since the recent devastating hurricane and fears were expressed that a prolonged hard rain would cause much damage here.

An intermittent rain which started here early last night and continued today coupled with a moderate wind, increased apprehension locally that the hurricane would strike Miami and this section.

Preparations were made to close all schools after first storm warnings.

HURRICANE HITS HAVANA

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 20. (AP)—The Western Union received the following message today from Havana:
"9:30 a. m. Belen college advises hurricane of great intensity central south and near Havana moving north. Vortex very near Havana. Barometer is falling rapidly. The greatest wind velocity yet registered is 58 miles an hour."

All communication with Havana via Key West was lost by the Western Union Telegraph company at 11:10 today.

The office here also was advised that the barometer at Key West had fallen from 29.65 to 29.53 within the last hour. The wind was increasing.
