Sister Mary Says:

BRKFAST — Grapes, cereal, thin cream, creamed dried beef on croutons, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Toasted bacon, cheese sandwiches, sliced tomatoes, peach snow balls, milk, tea.

DINNER — Boned and stuffed shoulder of lamb, boiled potatoes in parsley butter, julienne carrots, onion and orange salad, prune cake, rolled oats bread, milk, coffee.

With the exception of the cake suggested in the dinner menu there are no dishes taboo for children as young as four years of age. The stuffing of meat is not considered a desirable food for young children due to its high seasoning as well as its richness.

Peach snow balls are extremely simple in their composition but rather elaborate in their preparation. The housewife whose family likes "dressy" desserts will welcome this recipe on account of its economy.

Peach Snow Balls

Four peaches, 1/2 cup rice, 4 cups boiling water, 1 teaspoon red raspberry jam or preserves, sugar, butter.

Wash rice through many waters. Slowly add to rapidly boiling water with 1/2 teaspoon salt and boil 30 minutes. Drain and pour several quarts of boiling water through rice. Drain. Pare peaches and cut in halves. Remove stones and fill cavities with jam or preserves. Fit peaches together, making whole fruit and roll in sugar. Cut four squares of cheese cloth, dip in hot water, wring out and spread with butter. Cover with a layer of rice about 1/2 inch thick and put a peach in the center of each. Pull corners together and tie

There is a "catch", however. To wear these jumpers successfully a woman must have a military carriage or else resort to padding.

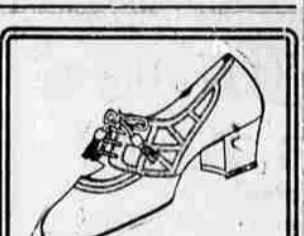
