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CHICAGO GANGS DECLARE PEACE

Police, However, Find Murdered Man Shortly After Armistice

CHICAGO, Oct. 21 (AP)—Peace has been declared in gangland. Gangster chiefs and their families were reported celebrating today the armistice between the Chicago and Chicago north side gangs which they have made. The recent tender of the olive branch in the words of one who "deplored the bootleg feud and their machine gun slayings because there is plenty of business for all of us."

But before the peace pact was more than a few hours old, the body of an unidentified man, about 25 years old was found on the west side. He had been shot through the head, apparently "taken for a ride," meaning murder in gangster parlance, but whether he was a member of the peace-making gangs was undetermined.
