Assistant Secretary Keeps Coolidge Posted on All Occasions

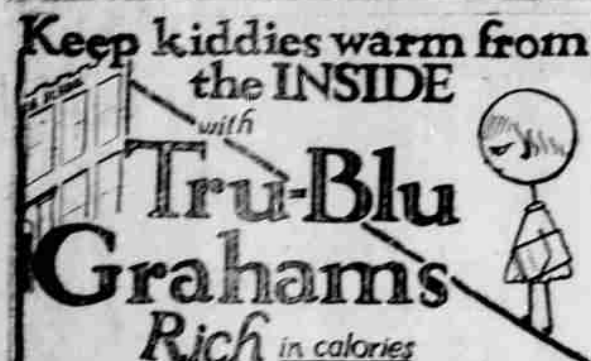

DO YOU HELP OR HINDER YOUR DIGESTION?

Have you ever thought how much you eat, dig or hinder a doctor in his efforts to diagnose your complaint and give you good advice and treatment?

His responsibility to you are obvious but do you not also have definite obligations in the way of giving intelligent facts? I can best explain my meaning by introducing to you, briefly, the latest patients who came to my study.

First—Mrs. A., married, intelligent, looks rather worried, and overworked. Suffering in and out of season. Suffering before and after meals. Has been "losing weight" for some time, but "just knows" he is on the wrong track. She says "It's her liver that's bothering me," and perhaps her "liver" is all run down, too.

If I could only give her a tonic to "build up her system" it might help. The worst trouble in the pain in her back that "draws up" into her head, mostly, but sometimes goes around to her stomach and back. The good lady guesses for herself and I try to collect my scattered wits.

Next a heavy-set, grim-looking contractor of 45. He's down and down impatiently with his fingers on my desk.

"What is the trouble that keeps you here?" I ask.

"That's just what I want to you to find out," is his answer.

On the defensive from the start. Suspicious—with a cold, icy information. Half an hour's hard work serves to convert a fairly satisfactory story of this gentleman's troubles—provided he had held the truth!

Finally there comes a plain-spoken but intelligent mother. It's about her six-year-old boy. Night before last he stumbled while playing on the sidewalk and scraped his right leg from below the knee. Her husband pointed the idea of "calling the doctor for a scratch," so she washed the wound and "dressed it up" with a clean rag. The leg was pretty sore last night, and Johnny woke up at 4 in great pain and vomited.

Someone's shoulder leg is touched or moved. Very swollen, hot and red around scratch. Tender jumps in groin. Whole body feverish. She has had no more in two months than the other leg is an hour or so because she has not forth when, how, and what it is in order sequence.

BONDS! BONDS! BONDS!

Voters are urged to read Section 4 of the Housewives' Council Constitutional Amendment authorizing the State of Oregon to go into irrigation schemes and into the business of manufacturing and selling light and power:

"Bonds of the State of Oregon, not to exceed five per centum of the assessed valuation of the state, may be issued and sold from time to time to carry out the purpose of this Article and the full faith and credit of the State of Oregon is hereby pledged for the payment of the principal of said bonds as the same mature, and the interest accruing thereon as the same falls due."

Every voter should know that the assessed valuation of Oregon is \$1,058,880,736, and that the Housewives' Council "Water and Power" board could issue and sell bonds for \$52,944,000. Your property would be a guarantee for the payment of this huge debt.

Oregon's total bonded debt, including that of all political subdivisions, is now more than \$166,000,000. Its State bonded indebtedness alone per capita, \$47.08, is the highest in the Union.

As fast as this political board might retire bonds, it would have the power to issue more; and as the assessed valuations increased the amount of bonds could also increase.
