ORCHARDISTS TO GET MORE WATER

New System Will Provide The Dalles Growers with Surplus

THE DALLES, Ore., Oct. 21.—Between 300 and 400 acres of the finest orchard land south of Sunset hill may be irrigated during April, May and June from the new Sroosis park pipe line, now practically completed by the city, was the report made recently by the water commissioners at a meeting of the board of the local chamber of commerce.

During that period the city consumption of water, except in an unusually dry season, is very light. Since the pipe line must be installed to supply the city water during the summer months and the cost of running the pipe full of water early in the spring is no greater, an irrigation project of considerable magnitude will be opened.

A two-inch connection, metered, has been installed at the high point where the city line crosses each orchard, and a large pipe will be laid south from the reservoir to carry the overflow back to the orchard land. The water is now being sold at 13 cents a thousand gallons.

Benefit Large.
The direct benefit to The Dalles will be large. The city will receive extra remuneration from the line during the months when it would otherwise only be flooding the city sewage system with the overflow, while it is believed that the orchardists will receive a crop at least a third larger by the application of water during the growing season of the cherry—a third increase on 350 acres representing thousands of dollars.

The chamber will cooperate with the water commission in a suitable dedication program when the water is turned into the new line, expected within a short time. Orchardists interested in a cooperative well drilling scheme can purchase a rig in excellent condition with most of the tools needed at a cost of about \$1500. T. A. Sammis Jr. reported. On the basis of ten men in the organization, the price would be about \$150 each, which is less than the cost of moving a rig here from some other part of the state to drill a single well.

SUES BECAUSE OF AGE.

APPLE WIPING MAKING FRUIT MORE LURING

WENATCHEE, Wash., Oct. 21.—"There is every reason why the banker and the business man should sympathize with the apple growers of the community," said Frank Shultz, president of the Commercial Bank and Trust company here recently.
"They are in hard circumstances," said Mr. Shultz, "but I feel that apple wiping is a blessing in disguise. We are shipping out better looking apples and when we chance the grading rules we will have the best apples on the market. This is no time to feel down in the mouth. Just take another buckle in the belt. This is no time for speculation. Sell the apples, especially if the growers have some obligation."

Business Firms Incorporate in Delaware Often

DOVER, Del., Oct. 21 (AP)—Attracted to this state by one of the most liberal general incorporation laws found in the Union, between 65,000 and 70,000 corporations throughout the nation today are going business under Delaware charters.

The features of the law which has made the state a Mecca to incorporators are few, but compelling. It is easy to comply with. It is speedy in operation. And it restricts the state's interest in, and supervision over, its charter holders to the apparent minimum compatible with the protection of stockholders.

Liberal Features Attract
Financially, Delaware requires an organization fee of ten cents per \$1,000 for the first \$2,000,000 of authorized capitalization, and five cents per \$1,000 thereafter. Upon issues of no-par stock an arbitrary value of \$100 per share is set, for the purpose of taxation only. Because of this latter provision, the total corporate value of Delaware charters is undeterminable.

The annual tax also is levied on the basis of authorized capitalization. Simple annual reports are necessary, but they do not require disclosure of the corporation's financial affairs. Of all the company's books and records, only an original or duplicate stock ledger must be kept in Delaware. Here, except for provisions safeguarding stockholders the state's interest ceases.

Stock Not Taxed
Stock held by non-residents is not taxed, nor is it subject to an inheritance levy. The corporation itself has no income tax to pay.

Incorporation can be completed within 24 hours. The incorporators need not personally appear or even be named. They may attend their first incorporator's meeting by proxy; the minutes and stock ledger will be mailed to them anywhere in the United States.

Western States Producing 41 of Each 100 Apples

CHICAGO, Oct. 21. (AP)—From growing a total of less than 17 per cent of all the apples produced in the United States in the five years from 1881 to 1895, the states west of the Mississippi river have now advanced to a position, in the five years 1921-1925, where they produce almost 41 per cent of all the apples grown in this country. The state of Washington leads all the other states in both production and shipments of apples.

This remarkable development is further illustrated by the fact that 354 carloads of apples from the state of Washington were unloaded in New York during the year 1925, while 2711 cars of apples from this state were unloaded at Chicago. The state of Idaho during 1925 shipped 6236 cars of apples to various destinations throughout the country, while Oregon shipped 4322 cars; Arkansas 3219; Colorado 2737 cars and Missouri 2606 cars.
