Given but five minutes to live, none with the man who has been commissioned to kill her, a beautifully gowned Russian aristocrat looks wildly around a gorgeous room, decorated by plundering revolutionists.

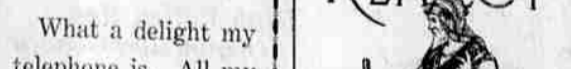
