## REED CHARGES FALSEHOOD KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 25 (AP)—

Chairman Reed, of the senate campaign funds committee, declared here today that the investigation of Indiana politics "proved conclusively that the chairman of the republican state committee put out a deliberate falsehood, and he was fully discredited." "He said that the state was flooded with money," Senator Reed added, "but the money turned out to be a lot of cheap pamphlets, and that gentleman and his stories were left suspended in the air." Senator Reed's statement about the Indiana republican chairman, Clyde A. Wall, was made after he had denied he had stated at Indianapolis last Friday that the Indiana inquiry was furnishing only "chaff."

## Queen Marie on Way West After Midnight Start

NEW YORK, Oct. 25 (AP)—Queen Marie, of Romania, today was aboard the rolling palace of ten special railway cars that will be her home for the two months of her western tour. Leaving New York at 7:50 a. m. she is due at Buffalo at 8 p. m. She will make a radio talk there from station WGY and will leave Buffalo for Niagara Falls early tomorrow morning. Her itinerary today called for two ten-minute stops, one at Albany at 1:20 p. m. and the other at Syracuse at 4:30 p. m. Queen Marie, with her children, Prince Nicholas and Princess Beana, and her retinue, boarded the train at Grand central station at midnight after attending a benefit performance at the Metropolitan Opera House of an interpretation of "The Lily of the Valley" written by the queen.

## Few Limit Bags Registered as Season Closes

Few limit bags were reported on the last day of the open season on Chinese pheasants, which was yesterday, as on the first day a week ago. The birds were scarce yesterday and what could be found were wild and hard to shoot.

Several hunters from here went to Umatilla county where they were fairly successful.

Some of the hunters brought home Hungarian pheasants, which seem plentiful there this year. The first Hungarian pheasants in the northwest were released at Spokane, Wash., about 12 years ago and now many of the birds are to be found in Washington, Northern Idaho, Oregon and as far east as Montana.

After he had finished hunting he set his automatic shotgun against his car for a minute, climbed in the machine and drove away, forgetting the gun. It is said. He missed it after a little while and went back but was unable to find it.

Hines was tackled for a 13-yard loss, putting the scrimmage line back to the La Grande 43-yard line. Duff came back for a 10-yard gain. With 15 yards left to play Duff elected to pass instead of Hines but, unable to see a clear backer player to receive, was tackled for a 5-yard loss just before the final gun sounded. With the game ended La Grande fans staged a glorious celebration, which wound up in a serpentine from the field to the business section.

Duff and Hines were the individual stars of the day, the latter reeling off 154 yards, including half a dozen runs of more than 15 yards. Their efforts gave Baker 260 yards gain to La Grande's 249.

Picking a star from the La Grande lineup would be an injustice to the rest of the members of the team, as all worked together as a unit, each man deserving equal credit. Price and Lynam rolled up the most yardage among the backfield men. The linemen, as a unit, proved stronger than the backs. Newlin and Zundel, at ends, gave a nice performance, and during the last half, center, guards and tackles presented almost a stonewall defense against Baker thrusts at the line. Baker exhibited good generalship in his calling of signals.

The game, as a whole, was one of the most thrilling grid contests played here over a period of five years and also a real exhibition of football as it should be played. Occasional fumbling failed to mar the general effect, as for each miff, a dozen well executed plays served as counterbalances.

The spirit of sportsmanship displayed by both the Baker and La Grande rooters was of a high quality.

Much credit must be given to Coach MacKenzie, critics believe, for his molding of the present Tiger team into a strong enough unit to humble the 1925 Eastern Oregon champions in so decisive a fashion.

## JUDGE BELIEVES MRS. M'PHERSON

Aimee's Kidnaping Story Held to Be Truthful by Jurist

HALL OF JUSTICE, LOS ANGELES, Oct. 25. (AP)—Superior Judge Carlos Hardy declared on the witness stand here today that he believed the story of Aimee Semple McPherson that she was kidnaped from the beach at Ocean Park last May 18.

The jurist, testifying as a defense witness in the evangelist's criminal conspiracy trial, stated he had "no reason to think otherwise."

The state charges Mrs. McPherson advanced the kidnaping story to support an alleged disappearance hoax.

E. J. Dennison, assistant prosecuting attorney, opening the state's cross examination asked:

"Do you believe that Mrs. McPherson was kidnaped?"

"I have no reason to believe otherwise," Judge Hardy said.

"I am asking you, judge—do you believe that Mrs. McPherson was kidnaped?" insisted Dennison.

"Yes," the witness replied.

The clerk rapped for order when a titter ran over the spectators' section.

Judge Hardy denied that he had employed detectives to go to Carmel, Cal., to investigate reports that Mrs. McPherson had been seen there with Kenneth G. Orniston, former Angelus Temple radio operator, last May.
