We feel that if everybody in the country except ourselves can be regulated we'll get along all right.

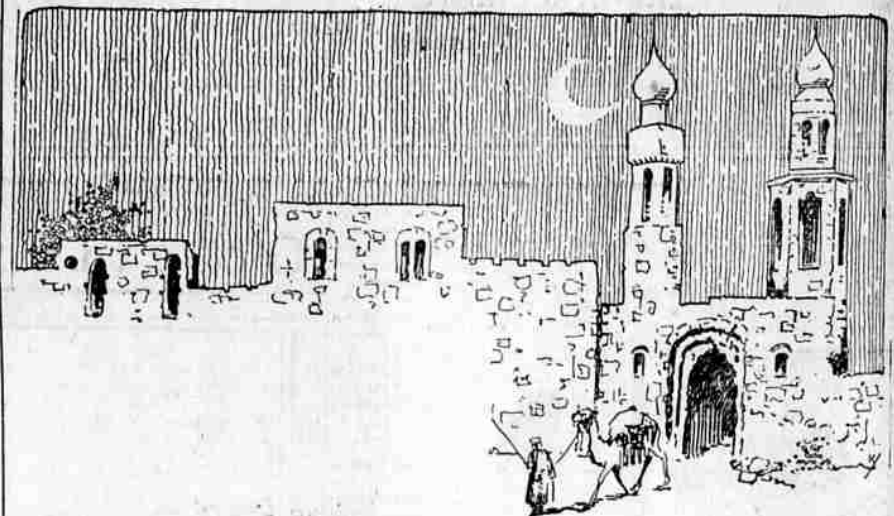
