FINANCES OF COUNTY GOOD DURING YEAR

There is a plan now being worked out to start filling the county unit and market roads next year, according to the commissioners, the county unit roads having been made a part of the market road system to be maintained by the same fund.

Outside of road building and maintaining, there are many other departments of county business maintaining, there are many other records show expenses well within the budget laid out by the committee last year. Salaries of officials and their deputies, offices of the health nurse and the agricultural agent, the purchase of equipment and the payment of warrants, road bonded indebtedness and interests are all being taken care of and on time.

"The county offices, including that of the road master, which was moved from downtown in 1923, are now all housed in the county's own building. The courthouse, built, and for many years leased the county, by the City of La Grande, was purchased in 1922 for \$23,500. By 1924, the last payment on the purchase price had been made. Since then the street in front of the building has been paved and paid for.

Expenses Wiped Out
In 1925, the county bought the old sugar beet brick building and lots, where the state and county shops are now located. Expense of that purchase and of construction of sheds for the storing of road machinery when not in use has all been wiped out.

By leasing the county farm to the superintendent instead of hiring him to maintain the place, a material saving in the upkeep of the farm and the care of indigent has been realized, the records show. As rental, the caretaker provides for four dependents with no charge to the county. For each person above that number, he receives \$12.50 a month. Usually there are six or seven inmates at the farm.

Schools, elections, upkeep and equipment of the courthouse, fuel, water master's salary, state, high school, city and special school levies, emergencies—these and other calls on the county's budget have been met by Union county in a manner that removes much of the anxiety from the task that faces the budget committee Friday, Nov. 5.

Decided preference is shown for browns and greys and their many off-tones, though blues are, as always, in the best taste."

Collegiate Trend
"Single breasted sack coats with notch lapels are in vogue. The shoulders are moderately wide and square and the body lines vary from form-fitting to rather straight lines. There is a distinctly collegiate trend in young men's suits. A preference for three-button models is indicated but the two-button models are in equally good style. Double-breasted models are in the best of style and are decidedly becoming to many men. The five- or six-button single-breasted vest has the call, though a few double-breasted vests are being sold. The trousers are straight-cutting and cut fairly full through the legs."

"Double-breasted models hold the center of the stage in heavyweight overcoats. The smartest models will be quite long, measuring 46 to 48 inches in length. Overcoat body lines vary from the semi-form effect to the easy lines of the full-box models. The rather long tubular overcoats, both single- and double-breasted, are popular with young men. Raglan shouldered overcoats are coming back strong, and the correct raglan is cut full, with plenty of drape."

Topcoats Popular
"The topcoat has added much in recent years to the smartness of the American man's dress. Topcoats are both single- and double-breasted, with the former much preferred. Collegiate models, 46 to 48 inches long, with rolling lapels, moderately wide shoulders and a half box effect are meeting wide favor and the raglan topcoat is also gaining popularity."

"Style in men's furnishings, hats and shoes is also determined by the moods of men. Today smart, seamy patterns and lots of color feature men's neckwear, shirts, scarves, etc. Brogue shoes in both tan and black are in good taste."

Brighter Color
"For the happier note that will arise from life in America in the spring, the clothing industry has provided clothing of unusual brightness in color and patterns and of very smart lines. Greys and tan in fancy, animated patterns will feature a season of unprecedented brightness."
