Home Pointers

To clean stoves, a common blackboard eraser is excellent. It will dust and keep the stove in fine shape. A high polish will result by first applying ordinary blacking, and then rubbing over the entire surface with the eraser.

Peeling potatoes can often be eliminated by first washing them, cutting them in halves, and boiling them. They are placed cut-side down in an ordinary potato ricer and masher. The skins re-

main in the ricer and the potato goes through.

Lime is a necessary requirement for bone and body building. Everyone needs a certain amount of lime daily. One-fourth cup of milk contains as much lime as five-eighths of a loaf of bread, or as 1 1/2 pounds of lean meat. One would need to eat six loaves of bread, or twelve pounds of meat to get as much lime as is in 1 1/2 pints of milk.

Griddle cakes are made much lighter and more tender by adding one-fourth cup of cornmeal to each pint of flour in the recipe used.

Carpets are brightened in color by rubbing them with a coarse

cloth wrung from a solution of four ounces of alum dissolved in about one gallon of water.

Spots in calico or cloth produced by acid are restored by touching with spirits of ammonia. Spots from an alkali are removed by moistening with vinegar or tartaric acid.

Ink stains on the hands are removed by rubbing the spots vigorously with vaseline, then with soft paper and finally washing with soap and water.

TO THE VOTERS OF OREGON:

A few years ago the people of Oregon could boast that their state had no bonded or other indebtedness. Today it has a bonded debt of approximately \$20,000,000.00, which means a higher per capita bonded debt than any other state in the Union.

In addition to this great bonded debt of the state, our counties, cities, and other municipalities and taxing districts are loaded to the guards with debt, and raise the total to an enormous sum, the principal and interest of which must be met by the taxpayers of this state.

Irrigation districts alone have issued approximately \$12,000,000.00 in bonds, and many of these are now in default and of little value.

In the face of this situation the Housewives Council, Incorporated, of Portland, proposes to practically double our state bonded indebtedness through the construction or purchase of irrigation and power projects, and to this end has initiated a measure which would write the names of a hand-picked commission into our constitution, give it full power to issue and dispose of over \$50,000,000.00 in bonds of the state, and issue certificates of indebtedness without limit.

California holders of millions of practically worthless irrigation district bonds see in this measure an opportunity to load their holdings onto the state and at 100 cents on the dollar.

The state's venture into the irrigation field under the directing hand of the State Securities Commission has ended in many disasters. In view of this, what would be the result of further ventures under the guidance of the Housewives Council?

The federal government has under consideration the development of the Big Basin and Umatilla power projects along the Columbia river. Secretary Hoover has given his endorsement to, and has assumed a leadership in these vast undertakings. This power when developed will serve every possible demand for years to come.

In the face of proposed undertakings by

the federal government, the water and power measure of the Housewives Council, Incorporated, is uncalled for, and if approved at the coming election, its administration by the inexperienced commission named therein will lead to debt and disaster.

The construction of these vast irrigation and power projects is work for the federal government. They should, and will, be financed by the federal government.

This state should confine itself to retiring its already great indebtedness; it should not permit a small body of misguided persons to plunge it into a slough of debt from which it will take years to emerge.

In opposing the measure Governor Pierce says:

"It would legislate into office five commissioners named by the sponsors for the measure, place in their hands, without recourse even to the courts of the state and with responsibility to no one, the power to pledge the credit of the state to the extent of \$50,000,000.00 or more, and leave them to disperse that money to whomever and for whatever purpose they saw fit. For at least four years that commission would be self-perpetuating in its personnel. The measure does not so much as provide for advertising the sale of bonds, or require that they be sold to the highest responsible bidder."
