Old Playmates To Meet on Grid Next Saturday

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 27.—When Montana plays Gonzaga Saturday at Spokane the fans will see two former Missoula playmates as rivals. They are none other than "Wild Bill" Kelly, Montana's great quarterback, and Francis Waltererkehen, Gonzaga's star guard.

Kelly is known and feared by all the coast as a great field general, forward passer and open field runner and any team that tries to beat Montana has Kelly to cope with. "Chippers" Smith thinks Waltererkehen is about the best guard he has seen in action and is depending on him to stop Kelly's smashes before they reach the line

of scrimmage. "Walter" specializes in breaking through the opposing lines and throwing the backs for big tows. Besides this he almost always is down under the punts with the ends so Kelly should see a lot of "Walter" at any rate the two former playmates are going to get together a few times at least next Saturday, and Bulldog fans are saying the opener the better.

Baler and Waltererkehen are having a pretty race for stellar honors in the guard positions. Against O. A. C. Baler was breaking through and making most of the Bulldog tackle, while against Multnomah it was "Walter" who threw the club backs for losses after time. Both are light fast men, about evenly matched physically, weighing 165. They both get down fast under kicks, and are a big factor in the Bulldog interference. Up to date it would be hard to say who holds the edge but both are affording the opposing lines plenty of opposition.

Trout Thronging Coos Bay Streams

PORTLAND, Ore. — There are hundreds of thousands of steelhead and cutthroat trout, all biting voraciously, and no one to catch them in the streams of the Coos Bay section, according to Matt Ryckman, superintendent of the hatcheries for the state game commission, who returned from there recently.

"I didn't see more than ten fishermen in the whole country," declared Ryckman. "These big fish grab the hook before it strikes the water, and fit up a stiff scrap before they're landed."

Ryckman was down looking after the fish for egg taking operations in January and February. He found the streams running strong, and predicts a record egg take from the Coquille and Coos rivers and other streams at Coos Bay.

"The fish from which the eggs are taken are held over November and December in ponds, and when conditions are right they are stripped of the eggs. These fish are caught by the same method in the same manner as commercial fishermen catch salmon."

Harry Greb Had Death Premonition

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 27 (AP)—Harry Greb, former middle weight champion, of the world, had a premonition of death.

This was revealed today by his brother-in-law, J. Elmer Edwards, a few hours before Greb, who died in Atlantic City Friday, was laid to rest in a grave adjacent to that of his wife.

"For the last month or so, Harry has been rather despondent," Edwards said. "He spoke often of death and seemed spiritless in many ways. When he discussed matters pertaining to the future, he would preface his remarks with 'If I live, I may do it.' Judging from his conduct for several weeks immediately preceding his death, now that I look back on them, I am firmly convinced that he had a premonition of his fate."

Pheasants Scarce In Wallowa Area

WALLOWA, Ore., Oct. 27 (Special)—Many hunters have been in the fields each day during the past week in search of Chinese pheasants. The birds become very wild since the shooting on the opening day of the season, and have been difficult to get except where dogs have been used to scare them out of their hiding places. But very few hunters report themselves lucky enough to get their limit. In most cases one or two birds making up the day's bag. While the birds have appeared quite plentiful in many parts of the valley section this season, many who have been hunting state they do not believe they are as thick as last year. Each year more of the pheasants are noted in the hill sections, where they were seldom seen two and three years ago.

Less Marriages, More Divorces, Statistics Show

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—The fewer marriages we have these modern days, the more divorces are recorded.

That, at least, seems the obvious deduction from the marriage and divorce statistics Director of the Census W. M. Stewart has just finished compiling for 1924.

In that year 1,178,318 couples were married, or 45,606 fewer than in 1923.

Divorces, however, numbered 170,952 in 1924, as compared with 165,994 in 1923.

As population increases, one would imagine that the number of marriages would increase, too.

And so it has since 1887, until 1924, with the exception of 1894 and 1904, when there were slight slumps, respectively from 1893 and 1903. These Director Stewart attributes to financial panics.

The record bears this theory out, for the curve was sharply upward in 1895 and 1905, suggesting that the happy couples were on Easy street again and in a hurry to set up housekeeping.

But the times were all right in 1924. "Prosperity" was the slogan on which President Coolidge was re-elected that year. The only conclusion Director Stewart can draw is that it was a period during which wedded bliss had, for the time being, lost something of its sentimental appeal.

In 13 out of the 48 states the number of marriages did increase even in 1924. What brought this
