NO ARMORIES NOW EXIST IN EAST OREGON

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For an \$80,000 building, the cost to the city of La Grande will not be more than \$28,000, and may be less than that, for the county may decide to share the expense. The American Legion, through the efforts of the legionnaires and the generosity of August J. Stange, is prepared to furnish the remaining \$12,000 to enable the city to match a \$40,000 state appropriation.

Donating Bill on Ballot
To raise the needed money the city voters will at the polls Nov. 2, be given opportunity to authorize the city commission to issue bonds to the extent of \$28,000, the bonds to be paid off one-twentieth each year for the next 20 years. The issuance of these bonds would mean that for each \$10 of city taxes a citizen of La Grande now pays, he would pay an additional three and a half cents a year over a period of 20 years.

18 Cents a Year
Estimating that the average city tax paid by a taxpayer in La Grande is \$53.37, the increase through the issuance of the bonds would mean about 18 cents a year. At the end of the 20 years, he would have paid \$3.60—his share in the city's expense of building the armory, his fee for the use of an armory that would serve the entire county as a civic center.

For it is proposed that the armory shall not only serve as headquarters for the national guard unit, insuring its continuation and growth in La Grande. The building would be available for conventions, for large social gatherings, for public meetings of all kinds, for automobile shows, for pageants, for home talent entertainments, for student meetings, for athletic tournaments, as a training center for all young people's organizations, and as an auditorium adequately and comfortably seating 1,500 persons.

Columbia River Bridge Completed

CASCADE LOCKS, Ore.—(Special to Bulletin)—The immense steel bridge, known as the "Bridge of the Gods", was completed here recently. The bridge is of the cantilever type with construction from both sides of the Columbia river. A pretty ceremony was enacted on the completion of the bridge. Two elderly people, closely connected with the former legendary "Bridge of the Gods" of early days, were the direct participants. Theodore Iman, born Aug. 23, 1854, at what is now Cascade Locks, and his sister, Mrs. Laura Iman-Foster, born at Cascade, Wash., which is directly across the Columbia river from the present town of Cascade Locks, were the two participants. These two elderly people approached the center of the bridge and joined hands, thereby terminating the brief opening ceremony.

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the proposed extension of the inquiry was not a fishing expedition, he might consider acting on Watkins' suggestion.

Harry N. Crain, managing editor of the Salem Capital Journal, of which Putnam is publisher, repeated statements made by Thompson and added that Hayes had informed him that the money had been sent as a result of solicitation by Edgar B. Piper, editor of the Oregonian. Hayes said the money was paid in two sums, \$10,000 some time in the winter and \$25,000 in the spring, Crain said.

He related efforts he had made to confirm Hayes' story. He asked Hayes to furnish him the details and the latter said he would do so as soon as he had the facts available.

Crain testified that he and Putnam had considered using the information as a news story, but as the time of the election approached they decided it would be better to submit the matter to the senate committee, since it might be charged that the Capital Journal was using it at the last minute when no answer could be made.

U'Ren Testifies.
W. S. U'Ren, Portland attorney, recounted his activities in the senatorial campaign. He said he had laid before District Attorney Carson, of Salem, information concerning the Stelwer company funds but that no action had been taken because it was not sufficient to warrant indictments.

U'Ren told of activities before the Multnomah county grand jury, which indicted six Portland men in connection with "the yellow ticket" matter.

U'Ren said under cross examination that his understanding was that the money alleged to have been paid the Oregonian was not for the personal use of Edgar B. Piper, editor, nor for the enrichment of the Oregonian. He said he understood it was paid in a perfectly legitimate manner as a campaign fund in the interest of Frederick Steiwer. He could give no exact authority for the information which led him to this belief, but said it was based on information from different sources.

END INVESTIGATION

SEATTLE, Oct. 27. (AP)—Investigation of senatorial campaign funds in this state was concluded here last yesterday without either the democratic or the republican representatives having been successful in revealing evidence of the large expenditures that have been alleged on behalf of the other party.

Yellow Pine Seeds Will Be Sought

BEND, Ore.—(Special)—Deschutes yellow pine may in the not distant future be "harvested" for its lumber. If a letter received here by R. L. Fromme, forest supervisor is any indication of the trend of a market in Europe. This letter is a request that yellow pine seed from the Deschutes region be shipped to Copenhagen, Denmark.

In compliance with a request from the Portland district office, several pounds of the Deschutes pine seed have been collected by local forest officials and will be sent to the Wind river forest experiment station for further culturing. The seed here was collected from the sun-dried seed cones.

The request from Europe for the yellow pine seed is taken as an indication that an effort will be made to introduce yellow pine on a commercial scale in places where Austrian and Norway pine once grew. The seed now being received from the yellow pine belt of the northwest is being used for experimental purposes.

work has been speeded up and made of a more lasting character. The purchase of a combination flusser which is used both on paved and unpaved streets, resulted in better and cleaner thoroughfares and less dust.

"We have had under contract macadam, storm sewer and curbing projects along Y, Spruce, Monroe and Jackson avenues, which will better northside conditions greatly. Other improvement districts are in the making."

"Another step toward street improvements took place with the appointment of a street superintendent a few weeks ago, who spends his entire time in this work."

"More sidewalk construction—cement, of course—is resulting at present than for some time, part of which is due to condemnation. The ordinance now in force prevents rebuilding of wooden sidewalks and therefore several improvement districts, calling for concrete walks have been created or will soon be created. A large share of this work cannot be completed, however, until next year."

"Other improvements, such as sanitary sewer work, have been completed and are under construction. Several thousand feet of new sanitary sewers have been laid this year alone."

"Last, but not least, contracts were recently signed for the installation of La Grande's first municipal ornamental lighting district, and the contractors are now preparing to establish the lighting units in the business section, hoping to have this completed before winter sets in in earnest."

Mr. Crews, in closing, expressed appreciation of the cooperation extended by interested citizens which materially aided the city administration in bringing about many of the improvements.

La Grande Citizens Vote on 19 Measures

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The fish wheel, trap, seine and gill net bill would prohibit the use of fish wheels for catching fish in the Columbia river in the state of Oregon; the use of fish traps and seines for catching fish in the Columbia river in the state east of the Cascade locks, and the issuance of licenses for the use of gill nets of more than 250 fathoms in length for catching fish in the Columbia within the state.

An amendment relating to elections provides that the vacancy shall be filled at the next general election only when it occurs more than 20 days prior to the voting time. Less than 20 days, it is held, does not allow time for nominations.

bacco tax bill passes. Two bills for the licensing of motor bus and truck operators are submitted: One of them is referred by the Oregon Motor Stage association. The other is initiated by that association.

Appropriating of 10 per cent of self-sustaining boards' receipts provided by one submitted act would transfer that money to the state general fund.

The Hydro-Power Bill
Last of the state measures is listed the Oregon water and power board development bill, initiated by the Housewives' council. It would create an Oregon water and power board of five elective members, appointing first members, the board to fill its own vacancies, and give the board full authority for development and distribution of electric energy and water; authorize state bonds not exceeding five per centum of assessed state valuation, principal or interest of bonds from the state general fund to be paid with repayment from bond funds; taxes to be levied to provide such money, and the appropriation of \$250,000 from the general fund, returnable from the water and power revolving fund.
