

Prohibition Is Success, Author, Secretary Says

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27. (AP)—National prohibition "is not a failure, nor is it going to be," says Dr. Nolan R. Best, secretary of the Baltimore Federation of Churches in a review of the situation prepared for the administrative committee of the Federal Council of Churches, and to be published by Horan and company.

A foreword, signed by Dr. R. Parkes Cadman, president and other officials of the federal council, describes Dr. Best's conclusions as setting forth "deep convictions held by the administrative committee."

"Since the book has been written as an individual utterance," says this foreword, "and not as an official pronouncement, the author has had full freedom in the expression of personal opinions. The book, however, effectively sets forth deep convictions held by the administrative committee of the Federal Council of Churches, that the committee warmly recommends it to the general public and bespeaks for it a careful reading."

Dr. Best declares it is not enough for prohibitionists to say "prohibition is the law." He urges instead that the friends of the day law should say "prohibition is a good law." Too many Americans, he observes, have reverted to the "cockle stage," pining for liquor as children used to pine for the cookies mother had locked up in the cupboard.

VALUATION OF BEND PROPERTY ABOUT \$9,100,000

BEND, Ore., (Special).—Total value of taxable property, as equalized by the county board of equalization, is \$9,099,585, an increase from last year's total of \$8,561,465, according to announcement of August A. Anderson, assessor.

Comparisons of unit valuations

between the two years show where the increases came. The average valuation per acre of land this year is \$7.36, where it was \$7.30 last year. The average valuation of taxable acres is \$20.71, where it was \$18.79 last year. Timber lands are the same, \$10 per acre.

Cattle, \$23.35 this year, were \$21.77 last year. Sheep and goats went up from \$5.99 to \$6. Hogs went up from \$5.50 to \$9.15, while bee hives dropped from \$3 to \$2.55 and poultry dropped from 24 cents to 20 cents.

PROMISE, Ore., Oct. 27 (Special).—Ralph Carper killed a coyote Monday morning, when he found four after his sheep. The coyotes are thick here this year and travel in groups. C. P. Carper lost two fine ewes last week and another one was injured by the animals.

Voters are urged to read Section 4 of the Housewives' Council Constitutional Amendment authorizing the State of Oregon to go into irrigation schemes and into the business of manufacturing and selling light and power:

"Bonds of the State of Oregon, not to exceed five per centum of the assessed valuation of the state, may be issued and sold from time to time to carry out the purpose of this Article and the full faith and credit of the State of Oregon is hereby pledged for the payment of the principal of said bonds as the same mature, and the interest accruing thereon as the same falls due."

Every voter should know that the assessed valuation of Oregon is \$1,058,880,736, and that the Housewives' Council "Water and Power" board could issue and sell bonds for \$52,944,000. Your property would be a guarantee for the payment of this huge debt.

Oregon's total bonded debt, including that of all political subdivisions, is now more than \$166,000,000. Its State bonded indebtedness alone per capita, \$47.08, is the highest in the Union.

As fast as this political board might retire bonds, it would have the power to issue more; and as the assessed valuations increased the amount of bonds could also increase.
