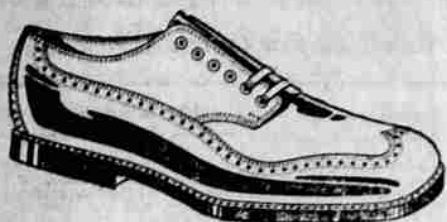

TOP BUTTER IS QUOTED AT 41c

No. Other Changes Recorded in Portland Market Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27 (AP).—Top grade butter is fractionally lower in the local market today with extras posted at 41c on the dairy exchange. No other changes were made.

Trend of the fresh butter market is being governed considerably by the heavy holdings of storage butter throughout the country and especially on the Pacific coast, where cooler stocks show a surplus of nearly 2,500,000 pounds over a year ago. Surplus holdings will show about the same proportional increase in nearly every section.

In Portland alone cooler holdings are more than double those of a year ago at this time. Creamery men are of the opinion that the big surplus will gradually be absorbed but they frankly admit that it will be a far from profitable season.

Egg Condition Better.
The egg situation is not so bad. Total cooler holdings on the coast are now considerably less than a year ago and being reduced each week. The fresh egg market is in good shape with extra grade stock in demand. While there was no change for the day in local quotations the market continues to display a good healthy undertone.

Top grade eggs here are listed at 50c as compared to 52c quoted in the Los Angeles and San Francisco markets.

Five Coos County Men Under Arrest

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27 (AP).—Five Coos county men, have been arrested on three secret indictments in connection with unlawful cutting and removal of government timber. The case involves about \$20,000 board feet of Port Orford cedar timber, ranging in value from \$10 to \$55 a thousand.

Burr Y. Druliner, Myrtle Point; John C. Davies, Marshfield, log and lumber buyer, and Robert A. Redell, Myrtle Point, lumber exporter, were arrested on one indictment, and on another, Joseph H. Druliner, Myrtle Point, and Davies and Redell. Both these indictments charge conspiracy to cut and remove government timber.

Walla Farmers Watch Grain Mart

WALLA, Ore., Oct. 27 (Special).—Many farmers in this county feel encouraged with the prospects for advances in the wheat market. Prices have ranged upward to a considerable extent during the past 10 days, and farmers who are still holding their grain feel that they may yet get a price which will give them at least a small margin of profit.

Some farmers state that, considering the low yields received this season, they will have to get at least 1.25 a bushel to break even. No large amount of wheat has been sold by farmers in this community yet, although scattering sales have been reported from time to time, with some of the grain going at slightly more than \$1.00 per bushel.

Manufacturing Of War Material Held Admissible

PARIS, Oct. 27 (AP).—International surveillance of armaments and manufactures of war material is admissible, the league of nations "mixed commission" decided today after lengthy sittings in Paris. The commission was appointed to discuss the economic phases of the disarmament question referred to it by the preparatory commission for the general disarmament conference.

The commission gives partial satisfaction to the United States view that disarmament cannot be effected by a mere proportional scaling down of military budgets. It recommends, however, that all states subscribing to the eventual disarmament convention engage to publish the full amounts of their arms expenditures of all categories.

TEXAS GIVES UP PONZI

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 27 (AP).—Charles Ponzi, financial wizard, today was ordered turned over to Massachusetts authorities by the Texas court of criminal appeals. Ponzi is held in jail at Houston. Ponzi has been fighting extradition for four months.

Score Issues in Upward Move in Exchange Today

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (AP).—Raising of the Pennsylvania railroad common stock dividend from a 4 to a 7 per cent annual basis following close upon the publication of unusually favorable third quarterly earnings reported by the U. S. Steel and General Motors corporations, today revived bullish enthusiasm in the stock market scores of issues moving up 2 to 5 points on an enlarged volume of trading. Pennsylvania common crossed 57 to the highest price since 1917, Atlantic Coast Line jumped nearly 3 points and Illinois Central and Delaware and Hudson 2 each.

Early weakness of some of the low priced motors was based on the speculative belief that the seasonal slackening in the fourth quarter would be more pronounced than usual, and that severe competition would result in further cuts in prices and resultant decreases in earnings. Leading commission houses reported that professional traders continued to dominate trading with buying showing a moderate increase but centering largely in high grade investment shares.

Wheat Rallies But Close Is Nervous

CHICAGO, Oct. 27 (AP).—Wheat opening ¼ to ½c lower, the Chicago market soon advanced. Corn and oats were firm, corn starting unchanged to ¼c down and then scoring gains. Provisions tended to sag.

Wheat rallied at the finish and closed nervous, unchanged to ½c higher; corn unchanged to ¼c up, oats at a shade decline to ¼c advance and provisions varying from 7c drop to 5c gain.
