MEET SATURDAY**

Winner of Coming Enterprise Match to Take on Karasick or Miyake

A wrestling and boxing smoker will be held in Enterprise Saturday, Oct. 30, according to word received here today from a member of the Wallawa county seat's boxing commission.

All Gustavo, of Enterprise, light heavyweight, will go to the mat with Jack Ryan, 180-pounder of Toxan, in the main event. Two boxing matches, one of eight rounds and one of four, will precede the headliner.

Speck Woods, 145, will meet Glen McCoy, 148, of Enterprise in the semi-final and Jerry Thompson, 118, of La Grande, will fight Cecil Lovell, 120, of Enterprise, in the preliminary.

Ryan comes highly recommended, having won over Ted Thye in The Dalles in 1921. He has also wrestled Kiltons and others of Northwest prominence. The winner of this match has been promised a chance to meet Al Karasick or Tarro Miyake, Japanese wrestler, on the next smoker.

This is the second of a series of smokers.

**Apple Forecast  
Reported Lower**

WENATCHEE, Wash. (Special)—The horticultural offices of Chehalis, Okanogan, Douglas and Grant counties, have issued a revised apple crop estimate, forecasting a yield of 14,507 cars of apples instead of 18,124 estimated last July. This is a reduction of \$489 cars of 20 per cent. It was made following a very careful check of every portion of the North Central Washington fruit district at the end of the season.

The drop in the probable apple shipments is attributed by District Horticultural Inspectors Geo. E. Harter and V. H. Firman to the early ripening of the later varieties and the inability of the orchardists to get the fruit off the trees before it fell to the ground.

Surgical operations are resorted to, and portions of the intestinal canal removed. There are treatments by glandular extracts, special diet, and re-education along various lines, especially in the arts and crafts department of many public and private institutions.

From personal experience I have become convinced that an enormous number of young people exhibit symptoms that cannot all be called evidences of absolute mental derangement; but these people are considered by relatives as "cranky" or eccentric. In the aggregate they compose an army. They are the "near-praecoxes" and fill the ranks of that undesirable body known by various names—tramps, hoboes, chronic loafers, often criminally inclined. To solve this menace is as real as it is tragic.

**HOLDS MARS HAS  
VEGETABLE LIFE**

Animal Life, Probably Amphibious, Also Believed to Exist

CHICAGO, Oct. 28 (AP)—A certainty that vegetable life exists on Mars from which animal life may be inferred, is expressed by Professor Philip Fox, head of the Dearborn observatory, of Northwestern university.

"It seems certain that vegetable life exists on Mars and where vegetable life exists animal life is certain to be—all conditions being equal," he said.

"The Martian animal however, is probably a fur bearing one, equipped by nature to live in the wastes around the polar snow caps. It must be, of necessity, quite small to be able to migrate rapidly with the changing seasons.

"Of course, nobody has seen evidences of animal life, and with our present instruments there is no likelihood that our generation ever will."
