ROYAL WEDDING BRILLIANT AFFAIR

Mulai-Idriss and Pasha's Daughter Married in Morocco

MAHRAKESH, Morocco, Oct. 28 (AP)—Oriental splendor surrounded the wedding ceremonies which united Mulai-Idriss, son of the Sultan of Morocco, to the daughter of El Ghassal, pasha of Marrakech and the most powerful lord of the Atlas district. The religious ceremony was held yesterday. The royal bridegroom, escorted by hundreds of magnificently caparisoned horsemen, rode into the palace, where his father, the Sultan, and the bride waited. He entered to the crash of thousands of rifles and the cacophony of mingled native and European bands. As the party disappeared within the walls the gates were barred, for the long and elaborate ceremonies must be held in strictest privacy.

Horsemen Maneuver

Outside, on the vast parade grounds, another scene was taking place. The famous black guards kept the immense and enthusiastic throngs while waves of horsemen executed intricate maneuvers. This continued until everything was obscured by the dust and the waning daylight. It was the climax but not the end of the rejoicing which began last Sunday, for at night the fetes especially reserved by tradition to the women folk were inaugurated. About 10,000 women residents entered the palace walls, there to sojourn and feast for ten days.

The bride and bridegroom are not participating in the festivities together, modern law requiring them to remain away from one another in the day time for seven days.

There was great rejoicing among the Sultan's subjects when he offered wedding garments to all those desirous of following his son's example by taking wives. Today those who accepted the offer were promenading the town attired in long baggy trousers and big sleeved shirts with large open collars, a costume which they believe will assure a harmonious married life and the advent of children within a year.

DRAG RIVER FOR BODY

BAKER, Ore., Oct. 29—Searching parties from Huntington and other nearby communities are dragging the Snake river between Home and a point five miles below Huntington, for the body of R. S. Guard Turns Out Strong in State Mobilization Test

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 29—Acting under orders from the United States war department, Oregon national guard troops in 21 counties held a test mobilization Wednesday night. The test began at 6:30 o'clock and was completed at 10 o'clock p. m.

Of the 5,100 officers and men constituting the state strength of the organization, at least 85 per cent responded to the call. It was stated by General G. A. White, the commanding officer, in Multnomah county, the percentage was more than 90, while some of the other counties were credited with 100 per cent response.

Infantry, field artillery, coast artillery, engineers and medical corps men were included in the mobilization. Officers expressed themselves as well pleased with the result of the test.

After mobilizing at the Army more than 200 troops in Portland, headed by a band, marched through city streets in full equipment and were reviewed at Fifth and Alder by Governor Pierce and General White.
