BAKER DEFEATS WALLOWA 50 TO 0

Bulldogs Run Roughshod
Over Visiting Eleven
in Great Comeback

BAKER, Ore., Oct. 30 (Special)—The Baker Bulldogs reverted to their old championship style of play here yesterday and, stung by a defeat by La Grande and a tie with Union, ran rough shod over the Wallowa high eleven to run up a 50 to 0 score.

The Wallowans were squelched so thoroughly in the first half that second string men completed the game for Baker.

Baker started the terrific onslaught on the first play with a 40-yard run by Hines. Shortly afterwards he reeled off another 40-yard dash, this time for a touchdown—just two minutes after the game started. Duff made the second touchdown and the score stood 12 to 0 at the end of the first quarter.

The game was made interesting by the spectacular playing of the entire team, the long runs for touchdowns and the efficient blocking of the backfield men. Derby made a 70-yard broken field run for a touchdown one minute before the end of the game.

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VANDALS, AGGIES PLAYING TODAY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 30 (AP)—Two powerful fast and fiery-spirited football eleven, the Vandals of Idaho and the Oregon Aggies, will face each other this afternoon on the Multnomah stadium gridiron in what may prove to be the "big" game of the Pacific coast conference as far as Portland is concerned. Both teams are in excellent condition, according to their coaches and trainers. All signs indicate the game will be played on a sun-lit field under a cloudless sky. Ticket sales point to a record-breaking crowd.

Today's game is most important in the O. A. C. schedule. To lose it would cause their championship hopes to topple. The orange team from Corvallis, with a record of two victories and no defeats to date and the reputation of being one of the best college football machines ever developed in the northwest, have been accorded coastwise recognition as leading contenders for the championship.

SCHOOL BUDGET APPROVED
EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30 (AP)—The Eugene school budget for 1926-27 was passed at a special election yesterday by 62 votes. Ballotting was the lightest in years, only 300 appearing at the polls to cast their votes.

At the same time the budget was adopted, the voters elected to levy a special tax on the district for \$207,143.84. The levy passed by a majority of 53 votes.

Oregon Five to Start Practice Next Monday

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30 (AP)—The uphill climb toward the Pacific coast conference basketball championship will begin again on the Oregon campus Monday afternoon at five o'clock when the first workout of varsity hoopers this season will take place under the supervision of Billy Reinhart, coach.

Prospects for the Oregon quintet this year are bright, according to coach Reinhart, who hopes to better the enviable record he rolled up last year in winning the northwest conference title and losing the coast championship only after a hard struggle.

As a preliminary training feature, a tour of California in the Xmas holidays has been proposed and several tentative games have already been lined up. The Olym-

pic and St. Ignace teams of San Francisco have already agreed to play. The tour has come to be an annual affair in the last few years, and according to Reinhart, is one of the best conditioners in the book.

Veterans Out
Three of last years five—a forward, center and guard—will be back in uniform this season. Roy Okerberg will be out for his old berth at center and, probably will have the easiest time of any of the old regulars in holding his position owing to the lack of pivot material from the freshman five. Jerry Gunther of the 1926 quintet will try for a forward and Aigot Westergren for a guard. A great deal of strength is expected from the players who come up from the freshmen teams especially from Scallon, Milligan, Pope, Epps, Johnson, Ridings, Hummel, Baily and Chastain.

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
