BUTTER REACTS AS WEEK CLOSES

Extras Advance a Cent—Other Grades Hold Steady Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 30 (AP).—After an almost daily decline during the past week, the local butter market reacted at the close and extra cubes advanced a cent to 41 1/2c. Other grades held steady and unchanged.

Butter production has been heavy during the last few days and with the big surplus in storage holdings markets all over the country have displayed weakness. Receipts Friday, however, were not so large and there was a good inquiry for high score cubes. Receipts from country creameries amounted to 5,641 pounds with the local make totaling 13,453 pounds.

The egg market closed steady and unchanged after recent declines. Fresh standard extras are down to 48c with firsts at 45c and mediums at 35c.

Receipts yesterday totaled 1277 cases and 619 cases were pulled from coolers.

Egg markets throughout the country are generally in a good healthy condition in spite of recent declines on the coast. Storage stocks are far below a year ago and at the present rate of withdrawal will be absorbed by the first of the year.

Country dressed meats were a trifle firmer at the close with choice light calves going at 16c and hogs at 17c. Poultry was moving out steady.

Idaho fumbled. Jacoby on a crisscross gained two yards. A forward pass was incomplete. It was the "Aggie's" ball on their own 25 yard line. Lieber gave penalized five yards for off side. Idaho again penalized five yards, making first down. At the end of the first period neither team had scored.

Main Tendency In Stock Mart Today Is Lower

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (By the Associated Press).—Frequent shifting of speculative sentiment imparted considerable irregularity to today's market but the main tendency appeared to be downward. Trading was in small volume, due to the exodus of many traders to out-of-town football games, and to a rather general disposition on the part of others to restrict commitments until after election day.

Wheat Drops More Than Two Cents

CHICAGO, Oct. 30 (AP).—Starting unchanged to 1/2c off, wheat rallied a little and then headed downgrade, falling 2c a bushel in some cases. Corn opened unchanged to 1/2c down, and soon suffered a general decline. Oats were easy, provisions irregular, wheat closed weak, 2 1/4 @ 2 1/2c net lower; corn 3 1/4 @ 1 1/2c down; oats 1 1/2 @ 1/2c off and provisions varying from 50c decline to 5c advance.

STATE INCOME TAX, TAXES ON STAGES AND BUSES, OTHER INITIATIVE MEASURES. Members of the Legislature will have nothing to do with these. "Proposals for a state income tax, taxes on auto busses operating on the public highways, together with several other measures will be voted upon by the people in November. If any of these shall be adopted, I will co-operate in passing such necessary and supplemental legislation as may be needed effectually to carry out the will of the people." WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT. The Workmen's Compensation Act, covering accidental injuries, should not be repealed. The minimum amount allowed to single men accidentally injured is slightly inadequate.

VOTERS' PAMPHLET. I favor and will vote for retention of voters' pamphlet.

STATE MARKET DEPARTMENT. I favor its retention substantially as it now stands.

PROPERTY TAX ON PRIVATE AUTOMOBILES, WITH CORRESPONDING REDUCTION IN THE LICENSE TAG. I am opposed to this suggestion. The present system is the only one to my knowledge which insures payment of taxes on every automobile.
