Queen Marie and Party Will Cross Borderline to St. Paul

QUEEN MARIE'S TRAIN EN ROUTE TO WINNIPEG, Oct. 30 (AP)—The United States again will take up the role of host to Queen Marie and members of the Rumanian royal party on Sunday, to keep it throughout the remainder of the continental tour except for a few hours which will be spent in Vancouver Nov. 5.

Winnipeg, the party's destination since it left Ottawa Thursday night will be reached tonight and St. Paul the next American stop will be reached Sunday afternoon.

Queen Marie expects to attend services at a Rumanian church in St. Paul and Prince Nicholas and his sister, Princess Ileana, are looking forward to spending some of the day in Minneapolis.

To See Flour Mill

Nicholas will be taken through a flour mill, a trip much more to his liking than making the rounds of official functions, and unless Ileana decides to go with her brother, who may play a few games of tennis.

Queen Marie has another day of rest in prospect today after her birthday anniversary yesterday, which she celebrated in an informal manner as hostess to her party and friends on the train at lunch.

Lawton Stearns Escapes Injury

According to Traffic Officer E. E. Bert, the cause of the automobile accident at the intersection of Washington and Fourth yesterday, in which Lawton Stearns' car was damaged, was the failure of M. J. Woodfin to give the right of way.

Stearns had a narrow escape from serious injury, his car turning over. When he was taken from the machine, he was almost unscathed, even his spectacles remaining unbroken.

Kelley Stay of Sentence Sought

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 30 (AP)—Judge Will R. King left here today for Portland on the trail of Chief Justice McBride of the Supreme court to get the signature of the chief justice on a writ of error to enable King to appeal to the United States supreme court the case of Ellsworth Kelley, who is under sentence to be hanged at the state penitentiary next Friday.

Kelley was one of the convicts participating in the prison break of Aug. 12, 1925, in which two prison guards were killed. The appeal, it completed will operate as a stay of execution until the case is disposed of by the United States supreme court.

The case against James Wilton, who also was to be executed next Friday, has already been taken by other attorneys.

INDIANS AID IN GETTING NEGRO

Burning Arrows Set Fire to Barn Where Killer Is Beseiged

CROW AGENCY, Mont. Oct. 30 (AP)—Ancient battle lore of the red men was called into play here yesterday to end a sanguinary skirmish about a besieged barn, participated in by 300 Indians and white men and a negro, which ended in the death of two officers and the beleaguered negro and the serious wounding of a third officer.

Ordered by Sheriff Robert Gilmore, of Big Horn county, to leave the agency because suspicion attached itself to him in connection with recent robberies, Jim Bolden, a 46-year-old negro cobbler, barricaded himself in a barn where he made his home, shot and killed Gilmore and John McLeod, a special federal officer, and wounded Deputy Sheriff Andy Dornberger before Crow Indian braves fired the structure with burning arrows and drove the negro into the open. A volley from 200 guns fired by the Indians, officers and residents of the agency, riddled Bolden's body as he fled from the blazing barn.

The negro was not dead when enraged members of the attacking forces reached him. A score of hands seized him and tossed him into the flames of his home to be cremated.

QUINABY MAN MAKING BOATS FAR FROM SEA

QUINABY, Oct. 30—J. C. McFarland of this place has established an altogether unique industry, that of boat making some 80 miles from the sea where the vessels are set afloat.

Having achieved skill along many lines, from teaching school to building houses, Mr. McFarland successfully tried out boat making the season just ended and supplied several local residents with sea worthy crafts which were taken by truck to Pacific City for fishing purposes.

Mr. McFarland is the founder of the town of Quinaby, having purchased the land and plotted the town at the time the Oregon Electric road went through about fifteen years ago. He also taught the Quinaby school for a time and was instrumental in having a warehouse erected here at the time he acted as agent for the company. This, however, was torn down, which caused an immense amount of shipping to go elsewhere, as the present warehouse is under lease to the celery growers for many years.

School Board to Pay Off Gym Debt

SCIO, Oct. 30. (Special)—At the annual school meeting of District No. 33, of Scio held on Monday night the school board was instructed to pay off an old debt for material and labor furnished for the gymnasium in 1922, in the sum of \$448.50. After placing this amount in the budget it was found that the budget could be reduced over last year \$497, which really makes a reduction of \$1145. Improvements on the school building have been made during the past year amounting to about \$400.

Deep Tillage Is Being Tried in Benton County

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 30—Deep tillage, a practice that is popular in some parts of California, is being tried out in Benton county this year. Mark Durbin, who is farming the country west of Corvallis, got a subsoiler from a Willamette community, got a subsoiler this fall and has worked over all of his fields with it.

The implement which he got runs 18 inches deep and requires the use of the heaviest tractor power which Mr. Durbin has. The treatment that was given the fields consisted of running this implement through them at intervals of about six feet. On each side of the subsoiler the dry ground cracks out for a distance of three feet.

After subsoiling the fields were plowed deeply and sown. This is somewhat different than the practice in some parts of California. There after subsoiling the fields are disced with a heavy machine. On this machine the discs are 22 inches in diameter and nine inches apart. After the discing the fall crops are sown.

Rector Brothers of Fairmont community are trying out a similar scheme to help them in drainage. A heavy subsoiler was used and back of the point a six-inch cone was pulled through the soil by a 20-horsepower caterpillar tractor. This cone leaves a hole approximately six inches in diameter in the soil and serves as a waterway for excess water in the winter.

All of the holes that were run parallel in one small field dump into an outlet ditch. This system of drainage is used where the installation of tile is not practicable.

BANKER FEELS LA GRANDE IN DEBT TO ARMY

CHICAGO, Oct. 30 (AP)—The finding of a hankerchief bearing the name of "Paul Rider" in Kenneth G. Ormiston's trunk at New York, in the latest development of the Alvin Karpis-McPherson case, seems entirely without significance to the Chicago evangelist's wife because "he's always losing them."

"It's ridiculous to attempt to attach any significance to the finding of that handkerchief," Mrs. Rider declared. "Why he leaves them everywhere he goes."

Mrs. Rider said she did not believe the evangelist had seen Mrs. McPherson more than twice in his life, nor Ormiston more than once, when Rider rented Angelus Temple in Los Angeles last January.

BLIZZARD NOW SWEEPS OVER STRICKEN EAST

LENINAKAN, Armenia, Oct. 30 (AP)—A blizzard which set in today, is sweeping over the region

devastated by last week's earthquake and adding to the misery of the homeless survivors. Earth shocks continue intermittently, and a particularly severe one was felt shortly after midnight.

The situation of the shelterless population is desperate and the morale of many seems to have gone. The problem of caring for obstetrical cases is most acute. At

the appeal of the Armenian government three near east relief nurses have been assigned to care for the newly-born babies, 72 of whom the earthquake ushered into the world.

Twenty-eight, including two sets of twins, were born in the American tent hospital. A second hospital under canvas has been opened to care for maternity cases.
