News of the Churches

Pageantry Will Form St. Peter's Evening Worship

Variety of Attractions Are Offered Churchgoers—Special Days to Be Celebrated.

With a hospital superintendent delivering a sermon at the Church of the Nazarene, two pageants being presented at the evening service of St. Peter's Episcopal, and several of the congregations participating in the celebration of Reformation day, the announcements for tomorrow's worship offer a wide range of attraction for the churchgoers.

Members of the Wayfarers' guild, assisted by the choristers, will interpret Episcopalian pageants presenting the life of St. Timothy at 7:30 o'clock. Special electric effects are being introduced. A curtain of "living angels" will be a feature not before seen in La Grande. Music by the choir will include the old Irish hymn, "St. Patrick's Brethren," and one of Bach's chorals. S. W. Allison will offer a solo.

The day's services at St. Peter's will commence with Holy Eucharist at 8 a. m. Church school will be at 9:45 a. m.

At 11 o'clock, the morning prayer service will include an address on "What Is the Pure Gospel and Where Is It Heard?" and a sermon, "The Unchanging Word," both by the Rev. Oliver Riley, pastor.

Church of the Nazarene

Dr. Thomas Mangum, dean of the Nazarene missionary sanatorium, at Nampa, where a new \$70,000 hospital is just being built, will deliver an address at the evening service. He will be accompanied here by a party of his workers. Earlier in the day they will have charge of a hospital day service at the Enterprise Nazarene church. Dr. Mangum is said to be an able preacher as well as a surgeon.

Morning service will be at 11 o'clock, the Rev. L. D. Meagers, pastor, preaching the sermon. Sunday school will be at 9:45 a. m. Nazarene Young People's society will have its meeting at 6:45 p. m., with Roscoe Jordan, the president, in charge. The theme will be "Characteristics of a Christian."

Bible school meets at 9:45 a. m. The adult Bible class will discuss "Movements That Led to the Reformation." The pastor asks all that have children of confirmation age to send them to his catechetical class at the parsonage Saturday mornings at 10 o'clock.

"Light and Shadow" will be the theme of the sermon that the Rev. Hall K. Wallis will preach at the Island City Community church at the 11 o'clock morning service. In it he will review Israel's history from the time of Joshua to the time of David.

Young people's meeting will be from 7 to 8 o'clock in the evening with Mrs. Renwick Clark as leader. "Peace or War" will be the subject.

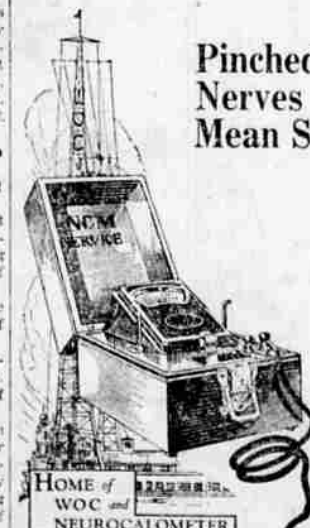
