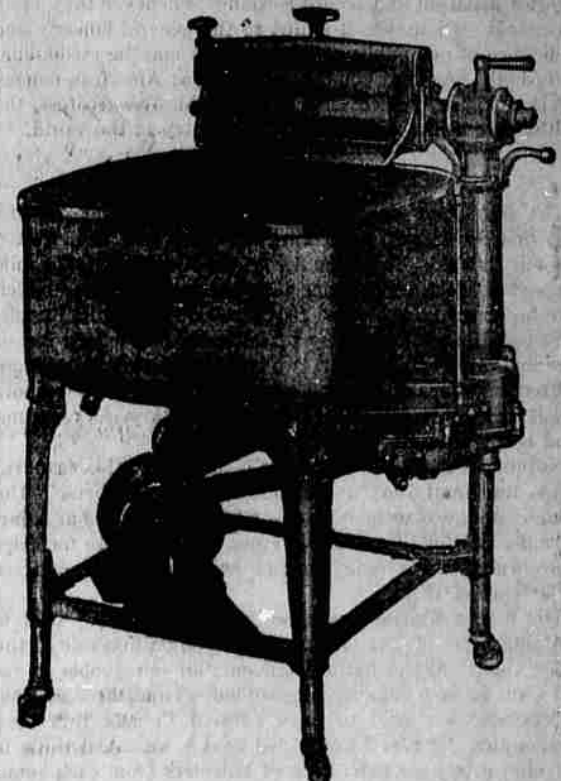
LONDON—Sir Arthur Pinero, who boasts he is quite an oyster eater, has been challenged to a contest by Lord Peel.

Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST—Halves of grapefruit, spinach with poached eggs on toast, bran and raisin muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Baked green beans with bacon, cabbage with French-Russian dressing, baked Indian pudding, milk, tea, rye bread.

DINNER—Cream of carrot soup, shepherd's pie, baked squash, head lettuce with Roquefort cheese dressing, baked pears in chocolate sauce, plain cake, milk, coffee, graham rolls.

What with French-Russian dressing and Indian pudding, the luncheon menu sounds like an international melody. However the French-Russian dressing is nothing more nor less than a French dressing combined with chili sauce. The combination is remarkably good with cabbage.

The shepherd's pie uses a cheap cut of lamb to advantage.

Shepherd's Pie
Two pounds lamb cut from fore-quarter, 1 cup sliced onions, 1 cup diced carrots, 2 tablespoons minced parsley, 1½ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon pepper, 1 tablespoon flour.

Wipe meat with a cheesecloth wrung out of cold water. Trim and cut in neat pieces for serving. Cover with 8 cups boiling water and simmer for one hour. Add carrots, onions, salt and pepper and about ½ teaspoon sugar and cook thirty minutes longer, until meat and vegetables are tender. Strain off all but 1½ cups stock. Stir flour to a smooth paste with a little cold water and stir into stock covering meat and vegetables. Cook, stirring carefully to prevent breaking vegetables, for five minutes after boiling begins. Make a border of mashed potato around a heat-proof platter. Fill with meat and gravy and put into a hot oven long enough to brown the potato.

The extra stock can be kept in the ice box until the next day and then reheated and thickened with rice to make a substantial luncheon soup.
