SCIENTIFIC MEDICINE PROVES ITSELF IN FLORIDA

(By Franklin Martin, M. D.)

President Gorgas Memorial Institute of Florida is proving itself again on a tremendous scale in the stricken areas of Florida, especially in those cities where the water and sanitary systems are completely destroyed.

Without the knowledge which scientific medicine has at its command and is putting into practice, the toll of death of the aftermath would exceed by many hundreds the number of dead from the hurricane.

"Pestilence Feared in Hurricane Area" was the headline in many of the newspapers in the United States following the disaster. Local officials warned the people against danger of typhoid fever from drinking water that had become polluted.

There was not a sufficient supply of water of known purity for all, but water treated with chlorine was available, and as a precautionary measure against contracting typhoid, the people were advised to get vaccinated against typhoid. These two things, chlorine and "typhoid shots," are contributions of scientific medicine which will save many from sickness and death.

To guard against lockjaw, always feared after a calamity of this nature, antitetanic serum was brought from many cities. Two hundred and eighty thousand units reached Miami from Richmond, Va., by airplane. Given in time and in sufficient quantities, it prevents lockjaw.

Not so many years ago an experience such as the inhabitants of southern Florida have gone through would naturally have resulted in epidemics of disease, fatal to many more than have lost their lives.

In addition to the few safety measures just mentioned, we in civil life have at our command other guardians against disease which will absolutely protect. I need only mention how vaccination protects against smallpox, toxo-antitoxin against diphtheria, and the newer serum against scarlet fever.

Despite these protecting discoveries, more than 250,000 people die in the United States every year who should go on living many years beyond the period of their demise. They die prematurely because they did not realize that when one of the vital organs of the body wears out through neglect or abuse, they cannot go down to the corner drug store and buy another.

No one had ever told them that wrong habits of living, such simple things as too much food, not enough exercise, too hard work, are possible of cutting off many years from the life span.

BUTTER UNEASY UNDER SURFACE

Apparent Steady Tone Belies Actual Condition in Portland Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP)—Butter production throughout the territory contributory to the Portland market showed a big increase during the month just ending. Favorable weather and pasture conditions were the principal contributing factors.

Both the surplus receipts from country creameries and the make of local plants report a healthy gain for October over September. No change was made in butter quotations for the month and while the market displays a steady tone on the surface the conditions actually are confused. With some of the cream buyers out with 40c offers and production reports showing a big gain for the past month, the local trade does not know which way to turn.

Under-sized eggs are firm and higher in the local market. On the dairy exchange, pullets advanced 2c to 37c and pews advanced 2c to 37c. Other grades remained steady and unchanged.

A decline of \$1.50 a ton on coconut meat has been announced by local vegetable oil mills. Prices now range from \$22.50 to \$24.50 a ton, depending on quality.

Potato growers are busy in the fields taking advantage of the period of good weather to dig the remainder of the crop. Trade, however, continued quiet and generally steady. The demand at Yakima is very light and the market weak, with no sales reported Monday.

There is a brisk call for fancy, dry pickled turkeys at prices ranging from 42 to 45c. Demand for live turkeys is less keen and prices are easier at 34 to 35c. Other lines of poultry generally steady and unchanged.

Weakness at the yards in the swine division is being reflected along the street for country dressed stuff. Today choice light pork was quoted at 13 1/2c with little or no demand. Choice light calves held generally steady around 18c.
