CONFIDENCE VOTE PLEASES O. N. G.

Major R. R. Huron and Men in His Command Appreciate Stand.

Early this morning, when sufficient returns had been received by the Observer to assure passage of the army bill, Major R. R. Huron, in charge of the second battalion, 186th Infantry, Oregon national guard, expressed appreciation on behalf of the guardsmen in his area for the support given the bill in this city.

"The building of an armory in La Grande will mean a great deal to the second battalion," he said. "It would serve as a battalion headquarters and all five companies in my command—Irish, Baker, Pompton, The Dalles and La Grande—will benefit greatly from such an institution. It means a great deal to the boys to be given such a sincere vote of confidence by the citizens of this city."

Now Up To Legislature

The passage of the measure here pledges the city to bond itself to the extent of \$28,000 to add to \$12,000 already on hand to match an expected appropriation of \$40,000 from the state legislature. Sentiment here is that with \$40,000 at hand here, the state legislature will not hesitate to approve an armory for La Grande and will take steps necessary to secure its construction.

The bonds will not be sold if the state should fail to make an appropriation and the question of whether La Grande gets an armory now rests entirely upon the legislature, which will convene the first of January at Salem.

Fruitvale Wins In Apple Exhibit

FREEWATER, Ore., Nov. 3.—The sixth annual Milton-Freewater apple display opened here with excellent displays of apples, small fruits and vegetables. Many entries were made in the poultry display and women's departments.

Fruitvale won the honors in the district display, the H. S. Dennison booth first for shippers, and Art Koon first for the growers' booth. C. L. Long of O. A. C. judged fruits and vegetables; W. C. Baldwin of Walla Walla college, poultry; Mrs. J. E. Jones, state club leader, canned vegetables and fruits. The large building was crowded when surrounding communities and Walla Walla put on a program.

Marshfield Budget Is Set at \$89,255

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Nov. 3.—A budget of \$89,255.85 to cover the expenses of the city of Marshfield for 1927 was prepared recently by the budget committee which includes the six councilmen and six taxpayers, and following a discussion of the various items the estimate was adopted by the council. The total budget for 1926 was \$88,742.80.

Salaries of the chief of police, fire chief and secretary of the fire department were increased by the committee. The salary of Chief Jack Carter, who has been on the police force for 25 years, was raised from \$125 to \$150 a month or from \$1,500 to \$1,800 a year. That of the fire chief from \$25 to \$35 a month, and that of the secretary of the fire department from \$60 to \$120 a year. The \$60 a year salary of the secretary, Norm Johnson, was set 18 years ago and he increase in work necessitated the boost, the committee believed.

Salvation Army Fund Drive On

WENATCHEE, Wash., Nov. 2.—After fixing the total campaign budget at \$5000, Salvation Army campaign workers, consisting of prominent local people, swung into action on a drive for funds on Monday and will continue for a week. Minard Anthony of the local advisory board of the Salvation Army directs the campaign.

One of the main objects of the drive will be to provide funds so the army may have a home here with funds to carry on its welfare, social and educational work during the year. The campaign budget consists of two main items, one being \$2500 for the purchase of a lot for the future home of the army, and \$2500 to be expended for rents, welfare and social work, educational ac-

County Offices Are Discontinued

DALLAS, Ore., Nov. 3.—In an order signed Tuesday by County Commissioners Riddell and Gardner, the services of the county engineer and surveyor are discontinued until Jan. 1, 1927, and all surveys discontinued for the present. The order stated that lack of funds made the action necessary. It was not signed by Judge Hawkins, third member of the court.

PLAIN Pie Crust

If you think good pie crust is hard to make try making it with Snowdrift. Use your own recipe or try this very good pie crust recipe from Kate Brew Vaughn.

Sift the flour and salt, and cut in the Snowdrift as quickly as possible. Cutting in with two silver knives insures the most uniform distribution. Do not take too great care to have this shortening thoroughly mixed—the flakiest pastry is the most quickly made. Add the ice water a little at a time, shaking in with a spoon, and use as little as possible. Divide the paste in halves and pat and roll out to fit the pans. Should be baked at 475 degrees F. until beginning to brown, then reduce to 375 degrees until done. Best results are secured by thoroughly chilling all ingredients and utensils. This recipe makes sufficient crust for one two-crust pie or two open-faced pies.

2 Cups Flour
1/4 Teaspoon Salt
1/2 Cup Snowdrift
