In the Columbia river, and to prohibit use of fish traps and seines for catching fish in the Columbia river east of Cascade locks.
A constitutional amendment which was ratified reveals an archaic provision in the state constitution, a relief of pre-civil war days which attempted to forbid free negroes and mulattoes coming into, residing or being in the state of Oregon, or having any civil rights therein. This was made void when the national constitution abolished slavery, and it remains in the Oregon constitution a dead letter. The latest session of the legislature adopted the amendment which was referred to the people.

The opinion was written by Justice Ben L. Overton. Judge George Tarnell of the circuit court for Multnomah county which sat as a probate court.

Dr. Norris Will Go on Trial on Murder Charge

FORT WORTH, Tex., Nov. 2. (AP)—Dr. J. Frank Norris, pastor of the First Baptist church of Fort Worth and fundamentalist leader, will go to trial at Austin probably in January for killing Dr. E. C. Chipp, wealthy jurist, here last July.
Granting a defense motion for a change of venue on the plea of the minister that he could not obtain a fair trial in Fort Worth, District Judge Hovey yesterday transferred the case to the state capital city, where the Travis county district court will set the date of trial.
Attorneys said it was unlikely that the case would be called there before January at the earliest.
Judge Hovey acted after more than a score of witnesses had testified they believed sentiment here was such that a fair and impartial verdict could not be obtained.

Arizona Quiz On As Votes Are Cast

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 2. (AP)—While Arizona's electorate went to the polls today to decide whether Senator Ralph H. Cameron, republican, or his democratic opponent Carl Hayden, shall represent Arizona in the United States senate, the investigation into corrupt campaign expenditure charges made by Cameron against the democratic state central committee was resumed before Senator W. H. King, Utah.
Both Cameron and Hayden have testified at the hearing which was opened Saturday night by King, a member of the senate campaign funds committee. Cameron's testimony, however, did not relate to the charges which he professed, and Hayden was an out and out denial of any knowledge of a combination formed to control the state economically and politically, and to bring about the defeat of Cameron as the senator had charged.

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REPUBLICANS LOSE GROUND IN CONGRESS

George E. Brennan and in Pennsylvania, Republican William S. Vare won a seat over William H. Wilson in spite of assurances by democratic senators they neither can be seated because of the disclosures in the campaign fund inquiry.

Eight states having referendums in some phase of the prohibition question were slow in reporting the full results. In New York the vote was heavy for modification.

The republican insurgents in the senate held one seat and regained two by the election of Smith W. Brookhart to Iowa, Senator Nye, of North Dakota, and John J. Blain, the La Follette candidate from Wisconsin.

Women Win And Lose
Women candidates were tasting the ups and downs of politics. Governor Nellie Ross of Wyoming, was trailing her opponent and Mrs. John W. Langley was elected in Kentucky to fill the house seat vacancy by her husband when he went to Atlanta penitentiary for conspiracy to violate the national prohibition law.

The presidential boom for former Senator Tompkins, of Ohio, got a setback with his defeat by Senator Frank B. Willis.
All the republican and democratic party leaders in the house were re-elected as were Senators Curtis and McNamara, republican senate floor leader and president pro tem, respectively.

FEAR INSURGENT RULE

NEW YORK, Nov. 3. (AP)—Once again working control of congress may pass into the hands of the republican insurgents from the western states. Slowly mounting returns from yesterday's general elections foreshadow the return of the insurgent group to power in the senate and indicate a reduction of the republican majority in the house of representatives.
The seven democratic seats at stake yesterday were filled by democrats all from the "solid" south and only three of whom had any opposition.
With defeat yesterday William M. Butler passed out of the senate. Brookhart will not take his seat until next year. Then he will succeed David W. Stewart, republican, elected today to fill out the unexpired term of the late Albert B. Cummins.
While the democrats have a net gain of six house seats they fell far short of their expectations from which full returns are in.
In losing a total of seven seats to the democrats, the republicans gained one from them—the third Rhode Island district—and also captured one seat from the farmer laborites.

GOVERNOR OF WYOMING IS IN SECOND PLACE

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 2. (AP)—Returns from 438 of Wyoming's 654 precincts in Tuesday's election early today indicated that Nellie Taylor Ross, the country's first woman governor, would follow Governor Miriam Ferguson, of Texas, into the political limbo.
Mrs. Ross, the democratic nominee for reelection to the state executive's chair, was trailing Frank Eversham, republican, 1,298 votes with the total count standing: Ross 15,833; Eversham 17,129.
Other republican candidates held leads much larger than Eversham and were practically conceded election.

W. R. Hearst Guest Of the President

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2. (AP)—William Randolph Hearst, the publisher called on President Coolidge today and remained as a luncheon guest.
After a visit to the white house offices, Mr. Hearst said he had not discussed politics with the president and that Mr. Coolidge had had nothing to say as that score. The publisher extended an invitation for Mr. Coolidge to spend his vacation next summer in California. The invitation was taken under advisement.

Burleigh Leads In Attorney Race

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Nov. 2. (Special)—Twenty-seven precincts in Walla Walla county this afternoon gave: Burleigh 161, Hunter 915, in the joint senator race.
Burleigh is leading Cherry for district attorney 1,045 to 725.
Burleigh carried the county 197 to 774 for Haney and Governor Pierce got 958 votes to Patterson's 725.
Hodgkin, for congress, was given 725 to Congressman N. J. Rinne's 987.

Grain Prices Drop In Chicago Market

CHICAGO, Nov. 2. (AP)—Opening 3 1/2 to 4 down Chicago wheat prices underwent a moderate further decline. Corn and oats were easy, corn trading 3/4 to 3/8 off and oats margining a little more. Provisions traded up grade.

Missouri Votes Against Repeal State Dry Law

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 2. (AP)—A prepetition to repeal the state prohibition law, lost by a majority of more than two to one on the face of returns at work yesterday and precincts in Missouri. The vote was 28,455, no 54,573. St. Louis city, however, voted in favor of repeal 109, precincts giving 19, 555 218 and 23,922 90.

Kellogg Seeking Improved Lights

KELLOGG, Ill., Nov. 2.—The chamber of commerce named a committee consisting of Max Richardson, John Brayer and E. K. Moe further to investigate the plan to be proposed to the city council for better lighting for the business part of the city. A committee had been at work previously and recommended 21 lights as sufficient, and the present committee is to push the matter to a decision.

NEW STREET LIGHT SHOWN

Monmouth, Nov. 2.—The Monmouth States Power company placed a new type of arc light on Main street in front of the bank yesterday. It was put there with the idea that the city might decide on using that kind for street lighting.
