Hawaii Gridiron Game Is Gaining; Lures K. Rockne

HONOLULU, Nov. 3.—That Hawaii is a coming force in American football, is evidenced by the fact that Knute Rockne, famous Notre Dame football coach will arrive in Honolulu this coming December to conduct a "school" in football playing.

Rockne will come to the islands at the invitation of Coach Otto Kimm, University of Hawaii mentor, whose teams have commanded attention on the mainland during the past few years. Kimm has turned out undefeated teams which have successfully repelled mainland conference champions. During the past summer the Hawaii coach attended Rockne's summer football school at Corvallis, Ore.

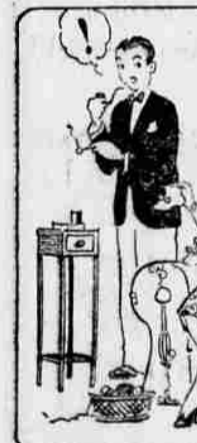

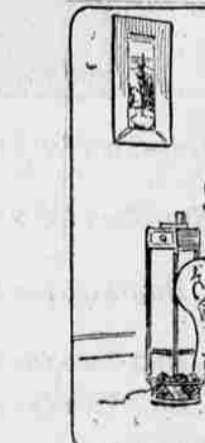
