PRINCETON AND HARVARD TO MIX

Crimson and Tiger Ready for Big Game to Be Played Nov. 6

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 4.—Princeton and Harvard, headlining Saturday's football bill of traditional rivalry, are not alone among Eastern friendly foes of long standing. The University of Pennsylvania and Penn State renew a football controversy after suspension of hostilities for a year, extending over a period of 36 years. The first game between Princeton and Harvard was played in 1890, a total of 28 contests having been completed in the meantime. Princeton has amassed a lead with 10 victories against nine triumphs for Harvard. There were three tie-decision contests. Princeton has won four of the last five games, Harvard's only success since 1921 being scored in 1923. Harvard won five straight games from 1911 to 1916, inclusive, when the series was interrupted by the war. Resuming the struggle, ties were recorded in 1919 and 1920. Pennsylvania and Penn State began to debate the football issue in 1906. A total of 26 games resulted in 1924. The 1924 contest resulted in a scoreless tie and there was no meeting last year. In 1922 Pennsylvania won Penn State out 7-0 but was crushed by the Nittany Lion the following season 21-0.

won last year by a score of 15 to 7 and the year before 14 to 7. West Virginia's margin of victory in 1923 was 17 to 5, the second successive triumph. The previous season's score being 9 to 6. Pittsburgh won 21 to 13 in 1921 and 34 to 13 in 1920. Both teams have scored in every game since 1919, when Pittsburgh won 26 to 0.

Schissler started his men with a light signal drill early Monday afternoon and ended up the day's work with a scrimmage practice that looked harder than any game played this year. All kinds of plays were practiced. Schissler is just beginning to open up his bag of tricks and it will be completely opened for the big game barrage at the Trojans.

New Coaches in Eastern Circles Proving Worth

NEW YORK, Nov. 4 (AP).—Four of the college elevens dominating the eastern gridiron spotlight this season have gained their positions of prominence under the direction of new coaches.

The quartet of guiding strategists now commanding interest with their achievements are "Toss" McLaughry of Brown, Billingham of the Navy, "Hill" Jones of the Army and Arnold Horween of Harvard.

All four gained unusual first year success in their jobs. Brown, Army and Navy have conquered all opponents so far and are clustered at the top of the list of eastern championship aspirants. Harvard, after a ragged start, has developed such momentum that the Crimson is conceded an excellent chance of hitting the "big three" for the first time in years. Confidence at Cambridge, in Horween is so strong that he has been offered a long term job.

Andy Kerr, Pittsburgh graduate and former pupil of "Pop" Warner, also has accomplished good results in his first year at the helm. Last Saturday's narrow defeat at the hands of Lafayette was the first setback for the Presidents. Pittsburgh predicts are more numerous in new coaching positions this season than those of any other school. Besides Kerr, the disciple of Panther gridiron schooling include Andy Gustafson at Virginia Poly, Jimmy Herron at Washington and Lee, Jimmy de Hart at Duke and Tom Davis at Rochester.
