NOT FAVORED

County Budget Committee Meeting in Court House Today

LIBRARY ARGUMENT  
UP IN AFTERNOON

Various Appropriations and Increases Are Being Sought by Delegates.

While various appropriations and increases are being sought by delegates and individuals appearing before the budget committee in the office of Judge U. G. Conch today, the action up to noon indicated that little increase in the tax levy would be contemplated in Union county.

The representatives petitioning the restoration of the county library—discontinued six years ago for lack of funds—were not to be heard until this afternoon. Nor had decision been made on the request for an appropriation to relieve the farmers southwest of Elgin, whose lands are annually flooded by back waters from the Grande Ronde river, because of increasing sand deposits that block its course. But in regard to offices of school superintendent, clerk, assessor, treasurer, sheriff and tax collector, the appropriations were almost identical with those of last year, while the allowances for the county court, the commissioners and supplies for the judge's office were in some cases considerably pared.

## \$1,000 For Hospital

To the fund being raised under auspices of the Pacific Coast Rescue association for the building of a juvenile hospital, \$17,000 of which was appropriated by the state, the county granted \$1,000 to be raised by taxation of individuals, which was approved by the board of commissioners. The Rev. Robert C. Lee, of Union, and Miss Pauline Houdurant, of Portland, appeared before the committee this morning in the interests of the hospital campaign.

Although County Superintendent E. A. Sayre's request for increased funds for office help, office supplies, institute expenses and boys and girls work was supported by the board of commissioners, J. T. Long-fellow, Principal E. D. Towler, and the Rev. George Albert Pollard, of the First Baptist church, the amount voted for that office was substantially the same as that allowed last year.

## Present Recount

L. McKinnon, Henry Mc-Goldrick, Sam Ruckman, Todd Conrad, and others interested in the dredging of the riffle near Elgin and the cutting of ditches to drain lands that within the last eight or nine years have been flooded almost to uselessness as grain lands, addressed the court at length on the food that could be accomplished—not only to the owners but to the county—through increased taxes and value, they pointed out by the appropriation of a small amount for an-

EIGHT CRIMINAL

Wallowa Circuit Court Term to Begin at Enterprise Monday

Eight cases, and every one criminal, are docketed for trial under Judge J. W. Knowles when he convenes the November term of Wallowa circuit court at Enterprise Monday morning.

Max Wilson, of Joseph, district attorney, will prosecute in each instance. A Fairchild, whose ill health has prevented his going ahead with the defense of each of the nine defendants, has turned two of the cases over to Green &amp; Hess, of La Grande, and is this week arranging for a transfer of the others.

Green &amp; Hess will appear for Dolly Buchanan, charged with giving false testimony in a previous liquor trial, when her case is called Nov. 15, and for Tom Tovera, against whom a charge of burglary has been fixed, to be tried next Wednesday.

Arthur Knight, Roy Young, James Coulton, Robert Walker, Lloyd Lubbes, Robert Wright and J. E. Baxter are the other defendants. Wright and Baxter are accused of cattle stealing. In their prosecution, Attorney Wilson will be assisted by Burleigh &amp; Burleigh, of Enterprise.

Reynolds, Accepts  
Warrant From City

The case of Lee Reynolds, plaintiff, vs. the city of La Grande, defendant, a suit for damages which was the outgrowth of a flow from the old septic tank over the plaintiff's property, was definitely closed yesterday when Reynolds accepted a warrant from the city for \$325.19, as payment in full.

The commissioners decided to pay Wednesday night during executive session, thus placing them on record as accepting the circuit court verdict. Reynolds' acceptance of this nature, inasmuch as the jury failed to allow Reynolds anything for alleged damage to land.

Companies Ask  
New Valuation

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 5. (AP)—Representatives of the Pullman Car company, the American Railway Express company, and the California-Oregon Lumber company appeared before the state tax commission today in an effort to persuade the state officials to cut down the property valuations on which their assessments in Oregon in the coming year will be based. The board has fixed the valuation of the Pullman company at \$1,483,421.50, the American Railway Express company at \$529,287.50 and the California-Oregon Lumber company at \$164,000.

The Pullman company attorneys who came from Chicago for the hearing, sought a cut of over \$400,000.

Differences Between Hill and Washburn Outwardly Settled

QUEEN MARIE IN  
VANCOUVER TODAY

Bids Good-Bye to Canada Before Starting Long Trip Through U. S. to Rumania.

QUEEN MARIE'S TRAIN EN ROUTE TO VANCOUVER, Nov. 5. (AP)—Queen Marie's special train moved on toward Vancouver today with a truce, temporary at least, having outwardly closed the breach among the controlling parties aboard.

Major Stanley Washburn, special aide to her majesty, and Samuel Hill, eccentric millionaire who induced Marie to come from Rumania to dedicate his unfinished museum of fine arts at Marjory Hill, Wash., were aboard the train despite Hill's announced intention to put the major off here. Major Washburn will remain with the party at the request of Colonel John S. Carroll, host to her majesty, who with Washburn left Marie's box at the Portland horse show two nights ago after Mr. Hill had publicly criticized the special aide.

Hill would "slap" Washburn and to "crush" him if the aide disobeyed his orders. Hill had declared he was "boss" of the tour. Washburn and Carroll immediately excused themselves to the queen and returned to the train.

In a statement last night, Colonel Carroll, who has effected a truce between Washburn and Hill, declared he was was "very much

Disarmament Question Is Too Complicated to Settle Next Year

GENEVA MEETING  
COMES TO CLOSE

France and Italy Disagree with Other Powers on Limitation of Navies Scheme.

GENEVA, Nov. 5. (AP)—A general disarmament conference in 1928 which would make some beginning toward limitation of armaments on sea, land and air with an agreement to hold a second conference within five years is the program of statesmen close to the preliminary disarmament negotiations which ended today with the framing of a complete report on technical questions.

The next meeting of the preparatory disarmament committee is expected to be called next spring and not before as the leaders wish time for the transmission of the technical report to all governments and for a mature study of it by them.

No Meet in 1927 The general belief is that no disarmament conference is likely for 1927 as desired by the last league of nations assembly. It is felt that consideration of political of the problems will not be completed in time.

The divergences shown in the report adopted today, it is felt, are so many and so wide that a spirit of accommodation and conciliation will have to be exercised by the statesmen before attaining agreement on a program to warrant the convocation of a conference.

France and Italy are still holding out for limitation of navies on the basis of global tonnage instead of tonnage by classes of ships as favored by the U. S. Great Britain and Japan. Italy has recently admitted that class tonnage standard may be suitable for the greater naval powers. 600 Collegians  
Participate In  
Riot; Arrest 5

Massachusetts Institute of Technology Students Run Amuck, Destroy Property.

BOSTON, Nov. 5. (AP)—Five students of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology had to appear in court today on charges of malicious destruction of property during a sensational riot in Cambridge and Boston.

Several hundred police reserves, several thousands of dollars worth of property was destroyed. The trouble started when 400 freshmen attempted to break up the annual sophomore banquet with tear gas bombs.

The banquet was being held at the gymnasium of the institute in Cambridge when the freshmen demanded admittance and were refused. Bombs were then hurled through broken windows and the upper classroom evacuated and went to the freshmen.

Six Knocked Out After a few minutes of fighting during which six sophomores became unconscious an armistice was declared and the students, 600 strong, started for Harvard square. Automobiles were wrecked on the way and trolley cars were stopped, their windows broken and wires cut. The University theater in the square was stormed as well as the police station. Harvard students, acting as ushers, helped repel the rioters from the theater.

The students then "crashed the gate" of the subway and took possession of a two-car train, riding into Boston free of charge. One woman passenger fainted during the ride, car windows were pulled out, electric lights broken and fire extinguishers emptied.

In Boston the rioters blocked traffic at Tremont and Boylston streets by stopping autos, tearing off their number plates and doing other damage. Several motorists whose cars were wrecked, threatened suit. The fight in the gymnasium resulted in \$1,000 damages, it was said. Five students arrested were bailed in \$200 each.

Woman Diplomat  
Is Refused Right  
To Come to U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5. (AP)—The executive order of President Woodrow Wilson barring advocates of anarchy, revolution or agitation in the U. S. has been invoked against the state department, this time to prevent soviet Russia's sole woman diplomat, Madame Alexandra Kollantay, from passing through this country on her way to a new post as minister of Mexico.

Previously the order had been invoked by Secretary of State Kellogg to bar the Count and Countess Waryol, of Hungary, and Shapurji Saklatvala, an avowed communist member of the British parliament, from visiting the U. S.

Madame Kollantay, former soviet minister to Norway, is in Berlin now and has applied to the American consul general there for a passport visa which would have permitted her to visit the U. S. The request was denied by the consul general, with the full approval of the state department, on the ground that Mme. Kollantay was "one of the third congress of the communist international who has been actively associated with the international communist subversive movement." She is the daughter of a famous Russian general but embraced bolshevism.

Instead of entering the U. S., Madame Kollantay will be compelled to choose a direct route to Mexico City or enter that country by way of Guatemala.

Burglars, Caught  
In Act, Get \$300

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5. (AP)—Safe burglars, surprised in the act of breaking in the office of W. J. McCready Lumber company early today, nevertheless escaped with \$300 in cash.

They were seen by A. O. Bordan, of the Hawthorne building, who was passing the office of the company.

He whistled in an attempt to frighten them away, but the pair waited long enough to scoop the money from a compartment. Bordan ran to a passing street car and had the conductor telephone police from the nearest call box. The safe burglars had forced open a rear door to effect entrance.

Drive Against "Wet" Republican from Pennsylvania Under Way

ELECTION FRAUD  
OPENLY CHARGED

Nebraskan Takes Lead in Verbal Attack—Philadelphia Investigation Planned.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5. (AP)—The drive against William S. Vare, republican, as the junior senator from Pennsylvania in the seventieth congress has opened. Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, who spoke in Pennsylvania on behalf of William B. Wilson, the democratic senatorial candidate, because of alleged excessive campaign expenditures with the republicans, declared here that Senator Vare, although technically elected, had been repudiated by the "honest patriotic people" of the state and that the Philadelphia machine had functioned as usual, the results in some precincts having been announced before any votes were cast.

Meanwhile the committee of seventy, an unofficial body in Philadelphia, was preparing to make an investigation in a number of Philadelphia precincts where Mr. Wilson was not credited with a single vote.

No Votes For Wilson Members of the committee attacked much importance to official returns which credited Wilson with no votes in 44 divisions in that city and with only one vote in each of a number of other divisions.

Discussion of the Pennsylvania situation is expected to be renewed here Wednesday when the senate reconvenes as a court of impeachment to try George W. English, federal judge for the western district of Illinois, on charges of usurpation of power and other high misdemeanors. In view of Judge English's resignation yesterday and the decision of the house managers to recommend that the proceedings be dropped, it is believed that the senate session will be only perfunctory. Most senators here now agreed that the senate would accept the house recommendations.

## Strength The Same

Related and scattering returns overnight failed to change the party lineup in the seventieth house, which remains at—republicans 235, democrats 195, farmers labor 2, socialist 1, and undecided 1. A total of 218 is necessary for a majority.

The senate of the seventieth congress will show 47 republicans, 47 democrats and one farmer labor, with one vacancy from Maine to be filled at a special election on Nov. 29.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 5. (AP)—Secretary of State Koser yesterday issued a call for a meeting of the state emergency board in Salem next Monday. Germany, England  
Eat More Apples

CHICAGO, Nov. 5. (AP)—Apples across the sea bid fair to supplant the traditional hands across. In particular, this year's extra bountiful supplies of American apples are finding an increased outlet, both in Germany and Great Britain. Reports today from the government bureau of agriculture economics indicate that 50,00
