4 Baker County Men Sentenced To Penitentiary

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 5.—Frank Leatherman, of Burnt River, has changed his plea of not guilty to a charge of larceny of a helper to one of guilty and was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary by Circuit Judge C. H. McCulloch. Leatherman was previously sentenced to prison from here on a similar charge and paroled.

William Attebury, who a few days ago pleaded not guilty to assault on Umberto Mighlioretti of Huntington last winter, changed to a plea of guilty and was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Mighlioretti was assaulted by Attebury and Louis Lane at the garage where he was working. He was taken out into the snow several miles from town, beaten up and left naked in the snow on a January night. Lane pleaded guilty to his part in the affair and is to be sentenced on a misdemeanor charge.

LEAVES BREWERY TO M. E. PASTORS

Rich Canadian's Will Is Peculiar—Many Believe It a Joke

TORONTO, Nov. 5 (AP)—The will of Charles Millar, lawyer and sportsman, in which he left brewery stock to Methodist ministers and Ontario jockey club shares to persons opposed to horse racing, was regarded by his friends today as a joke. They said he intended to make another will, but no indication of another was available today.

The document, drawn up in 1921, disposes of an estate estimated at \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000. It provides that the proceeds of the estate after nine years be given to parents of the largest family born in the province during that time. Mr. Millar died last Saturday.

Some friends say that just before his death he told them that he intended to make a new will which would hold the shares for three years and draw dividends.

O'Keefe beverages stock worth \$75,000 is left to seven Methodist ministers. To retain the stock they must draw dividends on it and vote in the management of the company. The rider says the bequest is made "to see whether their avarice for money was greater than their principles." Another bequest of \$10,000 to a Catholic priest is for masses for the soul of a prominent citizen, "who will need them wherever he is."

LADY HONEYWOOD, HOTELIER
LONDON (AP)—Lady Honeywood, England's most extensive hotelier, has added another hotel to her string by taking over the Angel hotel in Cardiff, which at one time during the war was used as headquarters of the United States Navy for its forces in the region of the South Wales coast. Lady Honeywood now controls nine hotels in this country, three of which are in London. She personally supervised the interior decorations of the Angel as well as the internal arrangements.

ACCUSED MAN IS IN COUNTY JAIL

Roy Kuykendall, of Walla Walla, Facing Charge of Larceny

Charged with rifling the cash register at the Silver Grill, after he had bargained for the purchase of the place, and tendered a false check for \$2,200 in payment, Roy Kuykendall, of Walla Walla, was this morning arraigned before Justice Hugh E. Brady on a charge of larceny.

Bonds were fixed at \$500 for his appearance for preliminary trial in justice court Monday at 1 p. m. Unable to furnish bail, the prisoner was returned to county jail. Kuykendall, with his young wife and baby, was brought back to La Grande Thursday afternoon from Pendleton, where officers apprehended him as he was about to board a train for Spokane. He had gone from here to Baker Tuesday, after an alleged appropriation of cash from the register. Warned by Dal Hidspeith, proprietor, over long distance telephone that he had better return to La Grande immediately to avoid being brought back, he apparently started back. His nerve weakening at Union, he hired a taxicab, and drove by the football road to La Grande, and on to Pendleton. Sheriff Jesse Broshars, suspecting that the defendant would try to reach Spokane, telephoned Pendleton officers to meet him at the train.

Mrs. Kuykendall, who returned here voluntarily, told the sheriff that she had been made to believe that her husband had borrowed the money.

IL DUCE PLANS DRASTIC STEPS

Police to Be Reorganized—Fascist Party Will Undergo Weeding

ROME, Nov. 5 (AP)—Mussolini's scheme to introduce more drastic means of protecting the fascist regime was presented by the premier personally this morning at secret sessions of the cabinet and the national fascist directorate.

The premier also had further conference with Secretary General Turati, of the fascist party; Minister of Interior Federzoni, and Minister of Justice Bocso regarding their proposed measures, the first providing that the recently approved death penalty for attempts against the life of the premier or members of the royal family be made retroactive; the second calling for reorganization of the police system, and the third authorizing sweeping revision of the membership of the fascist party with the object of weeding out suspected members.

An "Eye" For An "Eye"
It is understood that the retroactive death penalty law, to be drafted by Signor Bocso, will create a special branch court of cassation for the judgement of such cases. Instead of leaving them to the ordinary jury courts.

The old maxim law, "an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth," it was believed this morning would form the basis of the idea the premier has of sweeping aside all intrusions. The opinion was universal that it was Mussolini's intention to answer the country's demand for swift punishment of malefactors.

tion," asserted that it is apparent that no honest election was held and that the results were an impossibility except through "fraudulent manipulation."

Mr. Vare, Senator Norris added, "ran several hundred thousand votes behind the republican ticket and outside of the city of Philadelphia, where the Vare machine is supreme, Mr. Vare was defeated by 59,000 majority."

Illustrating what he designated the "methods followed by this machine," he said that "in 76 voting precincts in Philadelphia, casting in round numbers 17,000 votes Mr. Wilson is given a total of 32 votes. Does any sane, patriotic citizen of the U. S. think for a moment that these figures are the actual result of a fair and honest election?"

Although several senators, chiefly from the democratic side, have expressed their determination to contest Senator-Elect Vare's right to a seat, they seem agreed that no action could be taken until he presents his certificate of election from Pennsylvania when the seventy-eighth congress convenes.

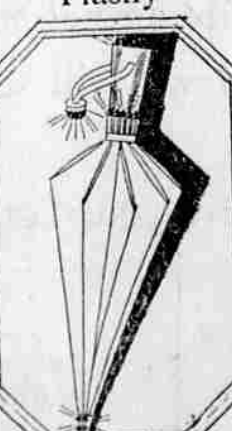
