

BUTTER MARKET TONE IMPROVING

Fresh Egg Values Continue on Downward Trend in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5 (AP).—A slightly improved tone shown in local butter market today with prices for the first time higher on the exchange at 25c. Other grades were unchanged. Receipts Thursday were limited to 2,175 lbs. and 2,000 lbs. came out of storage. The local make totaled 15,181 pounds, for the day.

Fresh egg values continue on the downward trend in the local market due to the mild weather in the eastern combining centers and decline in the principal coast markets. Extras and firsts are a cent lower for the day at 47 and 44c, respectively, while pullets came off 2 cents to 35c.

Country dressed hogs are weak and lower along the coast with the general tone. Even choice light stuff is hard to move. Receipts, too, have been more liberal the past few days. Choice calves steady at 14.00-14.50.

Local poultry dealers look for a better market on turkeys here, since the sale of the Idaho pool at 43c, 40c, 35c and 30c. On the street dealers have a hard time getting 43c for prime birds delivered here. Other lines of poultry generally steady and unchanged.

The potato market showing a firmer tone at northwest shipping points. Yakima is quoted \$4.40.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, Nov. 5 (AP).—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The wool market has been very quiet this week. The manufacturer, who apparently had covered their urgent needs, with few exceptions, refrained from buying, hoping, doubtless, that the tendency of prices in the foreign markets toward a lower basis and the result of the elections in this country might let some cheaper wool fall their way. As yet, however, it is difficult to see where prices have yielded much.

"The goods market is steady, although manufacturers complain constantly of prices. The mills are consuming a lot of wool, although some of the woolen outfits are slightly less active.

"Foreign markets are tending slightly in favor of buyers, although the continued strength of Australia on the best merinos is nothing short of remarkable.

"Mohair is rather slow, activities in the country being at a standstill."

Broader, Brisker Demand Is Noted In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (By the Associated Press).—Resumption of the upward movement in today's stock market was accompanied by a broader and brisker demand indicating to some observers an expansion in public participation. Subsidies of bear pressure and the apparent abundance of funds available on call loans stimulated pool operations in various speculative groups.

Chenopium and Ohio, which lost 2 points in the early trading, had an exception to the general upward trend of the railroad shares. Atlantic Coast Line was up 3 points, Frisco 2 and a number of others a point or more.

Public utilities were fairly active, some making substantial advances. Puget Sound Power rose over a point and advances were made in Electric Investors, Southwestern Power and United Gas improvement.

Phillip Morris' new stock was another strong feature, making a fractional advance to 1 1/4, a new high record. Victor Talking Machine moved up about 2 points and Warner Brothers Pictures advanced over 2 points.

The closing was irregular. Buying activities slackened in the final hour when U. S. Steel was forced back by the week-end profit-taking and selling pressure was renewed against some of the low priced motors. Total sales approximated 1,600,000 shares.

Wheat Shows No Sign of Gaining

CHICAGO, Nov. 5 (AP).—Opening 1/2 to 1 1/2c off, the Chicago wheat market suffered some further drop. Corn, oats, and provisions were likewise weaker, corn starting 1/4 to 1/2c down, and subsequently holding near to initial figures.

Wheat closed firm, unchanged to 1/2c higher; corn 1/2 to 1c down; oats 1/2c off to 1c up and provisions unchanged to 27c drop.

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 5.—H. J. Clark, millionaire mining man, was found dead in bed, on an Oregon lumber company ranch at Whitney Tuesday. He was about 60 years old and virtually penniless. He had been an inmate of the county poor farm several times.

Clark is said to have made and lost two fortunes in the gold fields in Alaska. He had worked in Baker county mines and shortly before his death was prospecting in the Greenhorn district. Nothing is known of his relatives.

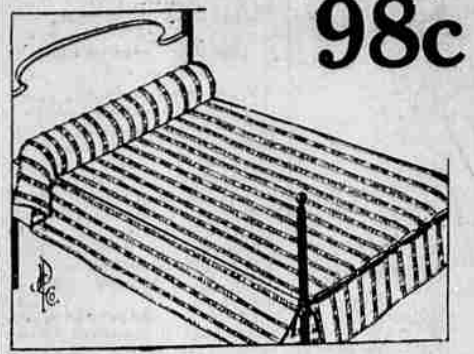
