Queen Marie Is Again Guest of United States

QUEEN MARIE'S TRAIN, En Route to Seattle, Nov. 4 (AP)—Queen Marie today confirmed that the breach between Samuel Hill, her host on the far western tip of her tour, and Major Stanley Washburn, her special aide, would be healed today by the same elements that she believed caused it, friendship and loyalty to her.

Although Marie plans to take no public notice of the dispute over present control of her travels, a spokesman for the queen indicated that she expected the situation to be improved when the royal train leaves Seattle tonight for the east.

The solution is thought to lie in the expected departure of Mr. Hill at Seattle and retention of Major Washburn as aide. The major has agreed to remain with the party, at Marie's request, but Hill has given no indication when he will leave.

Marie regrets that the two men, both her friends of world war days and both anxious to make her tour a success, have been unable to pull together.

is an English fish but the flavor of flounder so closely resembles the English delicacy that we use our own fish and call it by the English name.

The rule for tartar sauce is given in response to a request.

Tartar Sauce. One cup mayonnaise, 1 tablespoon taragon vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon French mustard, 1 tablespoon minced capers, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 tablespoon minced olives, 1 tablespoon minced cucumber pickles, 1 tablespoon chives.

Onion can be substituted for chives if necessary. One-half teaspoon powdered taragon can be used in place of the taragon vinegar. Any preferred mayonnaise can be used—the rule with hard

cooked egg yolks and 1 raw yolk is excellent—or, a rich cooked dressing is good. Mix the seasonings thoroughly before adding to the salad dressing and serve cold.

Chives or onion is sometimes omitted if the flavor is objectionable and 1 sliced fresh cucumber and horseradish can be added if liked. In this event the onion and onion flavor should not be used.

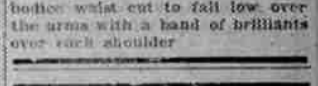

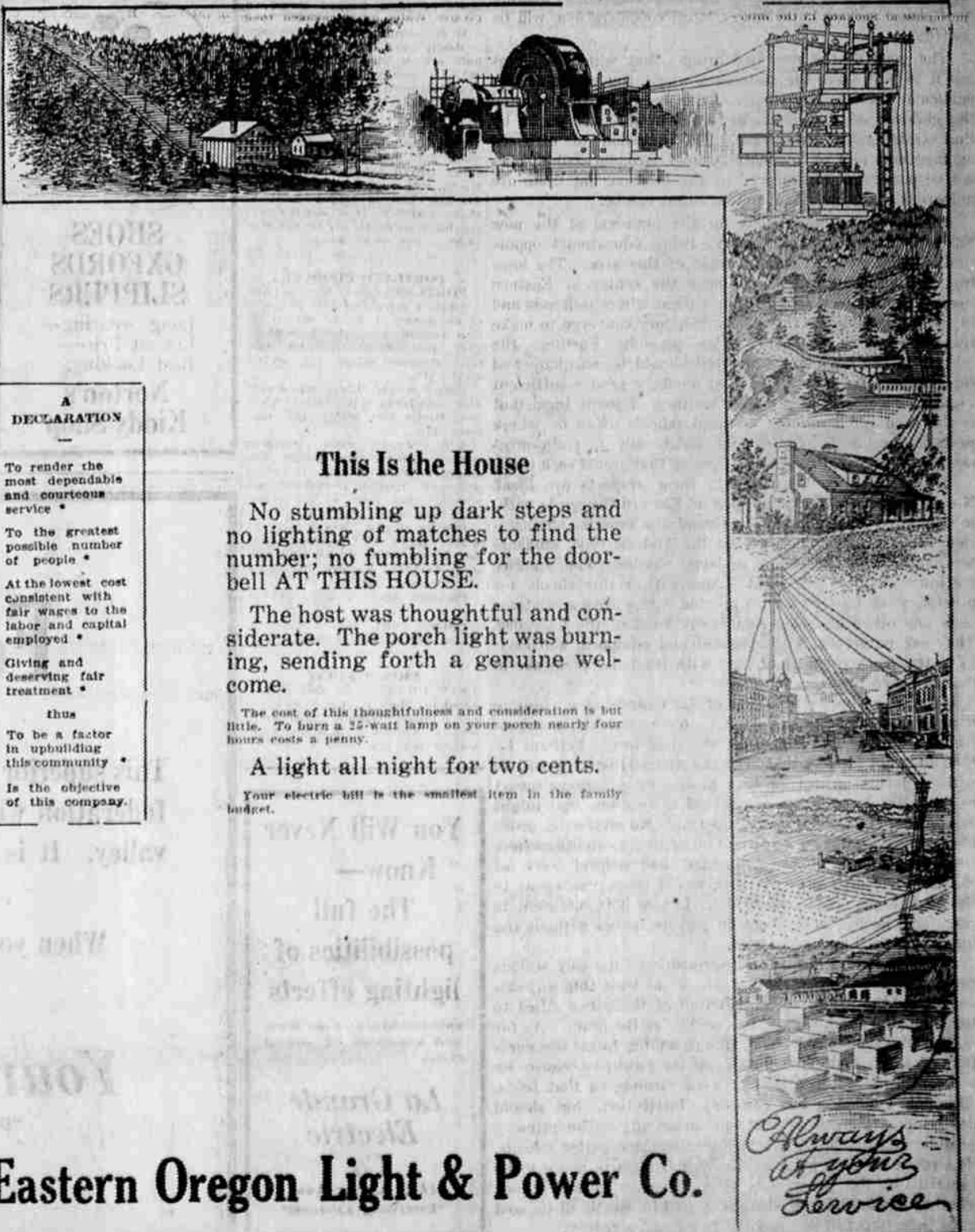
