Club Hears of Red Chieftains, Two Josephs

The Presbyterian Men's club met Thursday evening at the home of the president, Norman Frost, and was entertained by two interesting talks, one by A. W. Nelson and the other by John S. Hodgkin.

Nelson's subject was Chief Joseph, of the Nez Perce tribe of Indians. He told of old Chief Joseph and how his remains were recently moved from an isolated spot near Lost Lake to the Indian burial ground at the foot of Wallawa lake. After reviewing all that is known of the old chief, he told the life of the young Chief Joseph, and how he had in Wallowa county was taken from him. Before closing his talk he mentioned the movement now on foot to remove the body of the young chief from its present resting place near Colville, Wash., to Wallawa county.

Hodgkin discussed his trip east this summer, when he attended the sesquicentennial and many other things of interest. He told of the tobacco interest in North Carolina and the heavy tax paid to the government by the manufacturers. Hodgkin also discussed the Canadian laws, having taken the northern route through Canada on his way home.

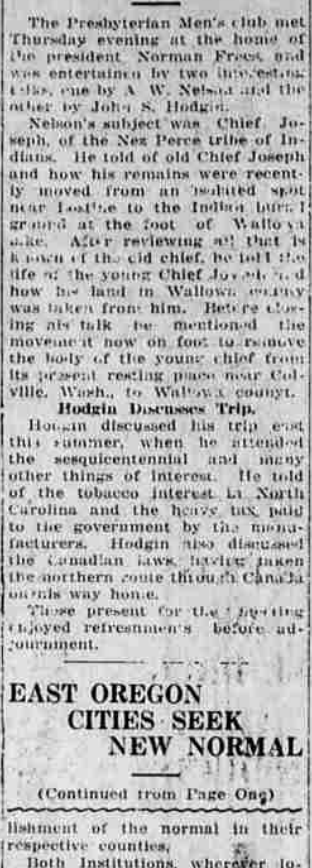
