Prepare La Grande For Armistice Day In Sunday Sermons

Bible School Workers from Convention at Baker Will Deliver Sermons.

With Armistice day reflecting in the sermon themes and speakers from the Sunday school convention at Baker filling many of the pulpits, services in La Grande churches tomorrow will take on a common complexion.

Mrs. H. C. Bell, of St. Peter's, La Grande, field secretary of the United Lutheran church, will be the visiting speaker at the Zion Lutheran Sunday school and morning worship services. At the 11 o'clock hour, new members will be received by the Rev. L. H. Aves, pastor, into fellowship of the church.

Mrs. Bell will also address the Luther League meeting at 7 p. m. and at 8 o'clock, will appear before the called meeting of the Women's Missionary society. The choir will offer special numbers. A teachers' training class, led by Mrs. L. H. Aves, has been organized with meetings in the church annex each Thursday at 7 p. m. under the direction of Mrs. Bell. It is used as the textbook.
